



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

## insights


Data supports previous historical narratives about the 1918 flu, but also:

- affected newborns and expectant mothers
- revealed undercount in Bulletin released by AZ Board of Health
- revealed nearly complete undercount of Native American deaths outside of Indian Health Services reports and more than 2,000 even in IHS report
- 50% of all flu deaths were Mexican and Mexican-American Arizonans
- flu hit Arizona's mining towns, reservations, and military camps hard
- flu hit Arizona during the November 1918 election cycle
