

The following bibliography is a guide to reference tools and government documents, related to environmental policy issues, since 1965. Within each of the categories, entries are arranged alphabetically by title. Citations follow the rules outlined in the Harvard Law Review Association, A Uniform System of Citation (11th ed. 1967), with some modification.

- 1) The TOTAL number of pages appears after the titles.
- 2) Publishers whose works are not entered under their name are indicated in parentheses before the date of publication. All other materials are Government Printing Office publications; however, they are not necessarily for sale by the Superintendent of Documents (e.g., Committee Prints are generally not available to the public).

Volume 2 covers more environmental materials than does volume 1.

Abstracts of Planning Reports 98 (1969)

Contains summaries of planning studies supported by HUD throughout the country during 1967 and 1968. Reflects the beginnings of planning that deals with law enforcement, codes and ordinances, government management and coordination, and physical development policies.

"...[A] compilation of references to current literature dealing with the problems of development and administration of highway transportation systems..." Includes control of access, air space rights, contract administration, eminent domain, easements, land acquisition and land use control.

15 J. Jacobstein & R. Mersky, Water Law Bibliography, 1847-1965; Source Book on U. S. Water and Trrigation Studies: Legal, Economic, and Political 249 (Jefferson Law Book Co., 1966)

A selection of judicial decisions, statutes, administrative policy statements, non-legal treatises, and unpublished doctoral theses grouped by broad categories and by states. A "Legislative Histories" section summarizes all federal laws on water and their amendments, and cites all documents published concerning them. A separate bibliography on water pollution law is planned for the near future.
