Heroin use on the rise, according to police

Police in both Aransas Pass and Ingleside both say that heroin use is on the rise.

Aransas Pass Police Chief Eric Blanchard said that heroin is on the rebound again in Aransas Pass. He also said that Corpus Christi medical staff have told him that this is occurring in all of South Texas.

Ingleside Police Chief Stan Bynum has

noticed a slight uptake in heroin use in individuals as well. He said the largest increase Ingleside is having is with the use of synthetic marijuana.

Care Regional Medical Center (CRMC) Business Development Director Randall Freeze provided data from the records regarding overdoses on opiates. After removing cases believed to be overdoses on physician prescribed medications, which were considered accidental, there were 19 overdose cases in 2013. There have been 10 overdose cases through the first three months

of 2014, which shows a slight upward trend. Most of these patients are in their 20s.

Chief Nursing Officer Christal Burns said the hospital does see a problem with heroin overdoses. Those who call 911 are usually taken care of by the time they reach the emergency room. EMS officials are able to give the life-saving medication called Narcan.

"Usually that is the main thing that they need and a lot of times one dose is enough and sometimes it is not," Burns said.

Some of these are not admitted to the emergency room.

"The ones that we see are the ones where family or friends put them in their car and bring them up here. We go get them from the car. They will be blue, be not breathing and often appear deceased or almost deceased," she said.

They are brought into the hospital and administered Narcan. The treatment is very quick, but emergency room staff recommends they stay for a while to be monitored and given additional doses if needed. Burns said those brought to the

hospital often sign themselves out once they regain consciousness and feel good, which is often against medical advise.

"What's so sad is that the parents aren't going to know about this. They won't know that their child almost died because most of them are adults, and if they choose to tell them, it's their decision," Burns said.

The hospital not only does not notify parents or guardians, but also does not notify police because of privacy policies.
