Be clear about what's involved in a service role



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- Responsibilities
- Committee charge
- Length of term
- Time required
- Number of meetings
- Virtual or in-person meetings



Being selective about service opportunities




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 You may have to be less selective in accepting service roles at the beginning of your career if you plan to establish a record of service.

- Nominating committee
- Informal arrangements



How can you be a good committee member?




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- Do more than the minimum.
- Attend every meeting.
- Participate in meetings but do not dominate them.
- Participate in online discussions.
- Reply to emails.
- Volunteer for assignments.
- Complete assignments on time.



How can you find time for service?



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- Ask about time requirements in advance and do not volunteer if you cannot fulfill the obligations.
- Keep your work calendar up to date.
- Block off time in your calendar.
- Keep a list of tasks to complete.



Document your service



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- Update your CV regularly.
- Retain letters from committee chairs.
- Keep notes about your work.
