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

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TEQUILA'S New Shot



IT WAS BOUND TO HAPPEN. GEORGE Clooney and longtime friend, bar and restaurant mogul Rande Gerber, have partnered with Discovery Land Company CEO & founder Mike Meldman to launch Casamigos Tequila. All three went on a national road trip to celebrate the launch of Casamigos, making stops in Dallas, Miami, Las Vegas and Los Angeles. The group kicked off the tour with a stop in Dallas where they met with key spirit executives signed bottles and met with fans all across town.

First, the trio stopped in at Iron Cactus and they made their way to a private event at the home of Shelly Stein, the president and chief executive of family-owned Glazer's Distributors. The group ended their night in Dallas at The Mansion on Turtle Creek. Where else? Apparently the first stop in Dallas was quite a success as we hear that the brand sold out in just one day. And we were there to be a part of the fun.

Casamigos' follows on the heels of Gerber's successful Caliche Rum, a super-premium white rum introduced last year and profiled in *The Society Diaries*. He developed it with Roberto Serrallés of Destileria Serrallés, a renowned sixth-generation family-owned rum business, which received the prominent four-star rating from F. Paul Pacult's Spirit Journal and BevX magazine, as well as a 93 Point rating from The Tasting Panel magazine.

"We love tequila. On the rocks, by the shot, at times straight from the bottle," Clooney and Gerber agree. Casamigos Tequila is a small batch, ultra-premium tequila made from the finest, hand-selected, 100% Blue Weber agaves, which are grown in the rich, red clay soil and cool climate of the Jalisco Highlands of Mexico.

In their late-night "research sessions," Gerber and Clooney preferred a sipping tequila known as Reposado, a term referring to the aging period when the spirit rests in oak barrels. This inspired the notion: "What if we made this stuff ourselves?" Then the fun began.

"Our idea was to make the best-tasting, smoothest tequila whose taste we didn't have to cover up with salt or lime," says Clooney and Gerber.

Their tequila was always intended for personal use, to be shared with family and friends. There is always a story behind the story. Casamigos, named after Clooney's and Gerber's houses in Mexico, roughly translates to "house of friends," and signifies getting away and spending time with friends.

Casamigos Tequila produces a Blanco and a Reposado. "Casamigos Reposado is smooth and clean with hints of caramel, while Casamigos Blanco is crisp and clear, with subtle hints of vanilla and a smooth finish. Both are great served neat or on the rocks, mix well with everything, and are the perfect base for premium cocktails," says Gerber.

MI CASA

1 ½ oz. Casamigos Blanco Tequila

1 oz. Fresh-squeezed lime juice

¹⁄₄ oz. Orange juice from a fresh orange wedge cut 1 inch thick, squeezed and dropped in the shaker

1/2 oz. Clear agave nectar

Shake ingredients with ice, then strain into a cocktail martini glass or serve on the rocks (salt optional). Garnish with an orange wheel floating atop.

SU CASA

1½ oz. Casamigos Reposado Tequila

4 – 5 oz. Grapefruit soda

1 Lime

Build into a tall glass with ice, then top with squeezed lime. Garnish with a lime wedge.

"We worked on the creation of Casamigos Tequila for over five years with our Master Distiller in Jalisco, Mexico, and conducted blind tastings with friends until we knew we got it right," says Clooney.

It's no secret that Gerber and Clooney enjoy a glass of Casamigos, but we had to find out from the direct source just how much tequila these two consumed over the years while developing the brand. If you ever wanted an indication as to how passionate these two are about making tequila, their Master Distiller from the Jalisco region of

Mexico says, "Through our process with Rande and George, we developed many taste profiles and degrees of smoothness until they knew it was perfect—approximately 600 liters (800 bottles), which is hundreds more than any other project we have ever heard of in the industry."

Clooney and Gerber Talk Tequila Lucas Flynn: How did you land on the

Lucas Flynn: How did you land on the flavor profile?

Rande Gerber: It was pretty easy because we really knew what we liked once we narrowed it down. We loved it and then did blind tastings with our friends to make sure. We had all the top tequilas lined up alongside ours. We probably had six or eight tequilas lined up. Everyone chose ours.

George Clooney: One day Rande was inspired while talking to the guys at the distillery and said, "Why don't we age the tequila in these old whiskey barrels, and give it a sort of smoky profile?" The minute we got those samples we knew it was perfect.

Rande Gerber: Right, the Reposado is rested in an old American white oak barrels that were used to make fine whiskey, and we reconditioned them. You still get a hint of that flavor, which is really unique. It is so smooth and it kind of has an oak-y flavor to it.

Lucas Flynn: Is tequila always the drink of choice for you?

George Clooney: It wasn't always; we used to drink a lot of vodka. Then we sort of got to a point where we were spending a lot of time in Mexico and you really are just drinking tequila down there. We like vodka on the rocks and Caliche Rum. You don't want to have a margarita all the time, which can kill you after about three with just the sugar alone.

It's not unbelievable to learn that Gerber and Clooney taste and approve each batch, along with their Master Distiller, to ensure the highest quality. Each batch is then numbered and signed by Gerber and Clooney. It is a fact that Casamigos' authentic minimalist design will reflect the men who created it.

"We talked about how this was going to be like the bottles you see in old John Wayne movies," joked Clooney, "where you slide the bottle down the bar, pull the cork out with your teeth, and pour yourself a shot."



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

Here, **Texan author Elise Ballard** who wrote Epiphany: True Stories of Sudden Insight to Inspire, Encourage and Transform caught up with Wright to learn about his own epiphanies and his insight on becoming the person you want to be.

LAWRENCE WRIGHT IS THE PULITZER Prize-winning author of numerous books, including the recent Going Clear: Scientology, Hollywood & the Prison of Belief, The Looming Tower: Al-Qaeda and the Road to 9/11. He is also a journalist (staff writer for The New Yorker Magazine), screenwriter (The Siege and Noriega: God's Favorite) and playwright (Sonny's Last Shot). The one-man show he wrote and performs, My Trip to Al-Qaeda, has also been made into a documentary film, and he also serves as the keyboard player in the Austin-based blues band, Who Do. A husband, father, and most recently, a grandfather, he lives in Austin, Texas


I will always be deeply grateful to Larry Wright. He adapted his screenplay about love, marriage and the craziness of the Texas Legislature, *Sonny's Last Shot*, into a terrific, fun play that was a big success in Austin -- and I played the lead female role. This role led directly to the epiphany that sparked this project. He was my very first interview for my book, and continues to be a supportive, smart, inspiring role model and friend.

Lawrence Wright's Greatest Epiphany in Llfe

Here is Lawrence Wright's account of his epiphany in his own words...

In 1990, I was invited to go to the University of Cairo to make a speech. It was the 20th anniversary of our wedding, so my wife and I decided to have a second honeymoon. We had gotten married in Greece, so after the speech, that's where we went – to the Peloponnese, my favorite region. We were in a little town called Epidaurus, which happens to be an ancient health spa. It also had the finest theatre in the ancient world. This theatre is still perfectly preserved, and it's just a beautiful, beautiful place. Walking through that classical environment reminded me of all I'd learned about ancient Greece and republican Rome. It struck me afresh what a huge role the *citizen* played in these cultures, how their common citizens were so empowered. By contrast, so many of us nowadays seem so jaded about the roles we play in society. And what about me? Was I really, fully, living as the person I wanted to be? And then this phrase came to my mind. It wasn't a voice but a very clear thought: "Take your place." Those very words. Over and over... "Take your place. It's time to take your place."

"Take your place," means become the person that you want to be. Don't put it off. Be that person. Be the



person you want to be in your family, your community, your job, your career. It's not something that you evolve into. It's something you decide: "I am that person." I had made the mistake of thinking I would grow into that person eventually. I must have had a prolonged adolescence, because I didn't really want to assume all the responsibility of being a full grown adult -- a full fledged citizen, a responsible parent. Those things demand a lot of commitment. What I realized in Greece was that if I am ever going to become what I wish to be, the time is now. I have to take my place -- in my family, in my community, in my career. Now is the time. There is no future. Or rather, the future is now. With those words, "Take your place," a bell had rung for me, and my life was fundamentally changed. Suddenly I got a lot more focused about everything.

When I got back, I resolved to become a better father and a more central figure in my children's lives. I got more involved with our family life. In my career, I realized that I couldn't go on procrastinating: Now was the time. As soon as I got back, I applied for an NEA grant. I never had the kind of nerve to do that before. To my surprise, I got the grant, and then I got hired by *The New Yorker*. The highest aspiration I had ever had as a writer was just to write for that magazine, and now



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suddenly I was working for them. Many of my "ultimate" career goals started becoming achievable.

Become More Active As A Citizen

I also decided I needed to become more active as a citizen, moving my community to reflect the core values that I stand for. Before then, I had never really been extremely civically or philanthropically inclined. None of the causes I'd encountered had deeply engaged me. But something about being in the ancient world, seeing the remnants of that great civilization in Greece, made me think that I needed to contribute something.

I love statues – the way that they organize public space, give dignity

I also started approaching life differently. I resolved that I was only going to do things that are really important or really fun. It's hard to decide what you're going to do with your life. Every opportunity comes with a cost. When you're weighing the alternatives that life presents, on what basis are you making your choice? Money is usually the main one. I knew I didn't have the time to waste obsessing over that. I wanted to use my life as fully as I could, achieving important goals, but I'm not Mother Theresa, and I didn't want to sacrifice joy and fun. So those are the axis on which I plot my life. Is it important? Is it fun? If



and occasion to environments that can otherwise go unnoticed, and call attention to values that a culture wants to enshrine. So one thing I did was start this little non-profit group called Capital Area Statues. Austin is a wonderful town, but it doesn't have much in the way of public art.

So with some friends I started raising money and commissioning artists, and we started putting up statues of local heroes around the city. It's been a lot of fun, and has intensified my consideration of the contribution and importance that art -- including my own art, my writing -- can carry for people who, like me, are trying to find meaning in life. Some people discover meaning in politics and some people find it in religion, but many of us find it in art. It's a commonality that stretches across all ethnic groups, all generations and genders. One piece of art can reach it's really important but not fun, I'll do it. I have to say that *The Looming Tower* was probably the most important thing I'll ever do, but it wasn't so much fun as deeply fulfilling. To give everything you have to a goal is pleasurable because you feel like you're being used fully and correctly. But it was a lonely, sometimes dangerous, and a very long, complex project. On the other hand, I also play in a band and that is about as much fun as you can have. It is thrillingly fun. My band and music is not important in any big sense, but boy is it fun, and so it's right up on the top of my axis of fun.

I'm not mystical. I don't think you can simply adjust reality by changing your attitude. But you have to set your intentions. Things don't just fall into your lap. You have to go out and get them. To do that, you must believe you deserve what you want out of life. And you have to truly believe that you're ready.


I have recently found that I am correcting people when I see an error occur in their grammar. I'm polite, yet is it wrong to earnestly correct relatives or friends when they are wrong?

However, this isn't often the case.

However, if you resonate and believe sub-consciously with the affirmation you're reciting, you will have a much better chance of seeing results. Both positive and negative, thoughts become actions.

Many of the resolutions people engage in during the holiday season have to do with goals that pertain to bettering themselves. Generally, most of us don't have a problem taking care of everyone around us; as a result, our own needs go to the bottom of the "To Do" list. This may require a commitment to make an appointment with a therapist or practitioner who can help delve into subconscious beliefs and negative thought patterns resonating in their body-mind systems.

They can then make a choice to react to old outworn beliefs or choose a different path. Where there's choice, there's empowerment, and that's the reason for making a resolution in the first place. 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LOVE'S SPRING FEVER

It happens every spring. It's when the heart and mind focuses on what the renewed warm weather does to our romantic sensibilities. Here **Austin relationship expert and professional matchmaker Julia McCurley** helps you prepare for the new season of love.

IT'S THE SEASON OF DUCKLINGS, FLOWering trees and open-toe sandals. Some people are struck with a mysterious malady called spring fever. There is now scientific proof that your heart doesn't just get happy about the little things. It is also more ready for love, for a variety of reasons.

Purported symptoms include daydreaming, falling in love and having the irrepressible urge to stay outside all day. What's not to love about that? There is no cure, though some treat the disease by canceling appointments and lying in the grass beneath the drifting clouds.

Elvis caught it. So did the poet Alfred, Lord Tennyson and Mark Twain's character, Huckleberry Finn. "It's spring fever," Huck exclaims in *Tom Sawyer*, "And when you've got it, you want - oh, you don't quite know what it is you do want, but it just fairly makes your heart ache, you want it so." I couldn't agree more. Here is more insight on why you are as susceptible in catching a heart palpitating case of new (or, re-newed) love.

It Is Hormonal

Hormone balances may play a role, so, if you suffer from spring fever, take advantage of the situation while you can. There is a theory that the monoamine neurotransmitter serotonin depends on daylight for its manufacture. This is the happiness hormone (endorphin) that overcomes the effects of the sleep hormone, Melatonin, and gives us a natural mood adjustment. Therefore, as the days become longer with more sunlight in the day, this endorphin takes better effect.



Sunnier Weather

Frisky feelings could also result from getting more sunlight. When the weather gets warmer and we see more sunlight, the melatonin in our body decreases, which studies show leads to an increase in energy and vitality. Sociologist Dr. Julie Albright says, "That brings about mood changes that make it easier to find a relationship," and I completely concur.

You Feel Sexier

As the weather gets warmer, we shed layers of clothes, we work out more, we are more conscious of our bodies. The combination of our waning appetite and our waxing wakefulness often leads to springtime weight loss, albeit relatively minor. Researchers at the University of Massachusetts who monitored the eating and exercise habits of 600 people over a one-year period determined that the majority of the participants gained two pounds in the winter. That was because they ate more carbohydrates and because they worked out less during that time. As soon as spring began, the researchers found, the subjects' caloric intake declined and their activity levels spiked. Maybe that explains why so many women love showing more skin in the spring; they are not just enjoying the warmer temperatures, they are also revealing slimmer figures to attract more romance.

Out and About

Winter imprisons us in its frigid arms. Once we begin to stay out more in the warmth, there's a better chance of being around more people and meeting someone who captures our fancy. Getting out of winter's captivity also makes you more festive because you are free from the cold and its confines for the first time in a while. It might make you more willing to take risks, too.

Increased Energy

Longer days increase our exposure to sunlight, which in turn reduces the amount of Melatonin secreted by the pineal gland (a tiny, pea-sized gland located at the base of the cerebrum in the human brain that is also known as the "third eye"). "There's more daylight, so people have more energy," confirms Dr. Sanford Auerbach, director of Boston University's Sleep Disorders Center. You're more willing to go to post-work happy hours, plan weekday dates and spend time socializing later into the evening than you normally would.

Spring in Your Step

To reap the benefits of this often magical time of year, listen to your body. Give it the vitamin D it's craving just thirty minutes of sun exposure per day between April and October, preferably at midday or in the early afternoon, is sufficient to sustain adequate level. Also, treat yourself to outdoor exercise whenever you can. Most of all, put your wool sweaters and heavy coats in storage, give your house a thorough spring cleaning, resume your trips to the farmers' market, and help me celebrate the end of the winter blues. I'll see you in the park. §

"There was a time, when Neal was 25 when he was always considered to be the most beautiful man in any room," shares Becca Cason Thrash, Houston philanthropist and Hamil's longtime friend. Possessing that kind of beauty has helped Hamil determine it in others during his successful career.

HOUSTON TO MANHATTAN

Hamil, a native Houstonian who has retained those model good looks, lives a charmed life in New York, where he now lives. He often dashes in between his many cameo appearances on Tyra Banks' "Top Model" series on the CW network and has guested on NBC's "The Today Show" on such topics as racism in the modeling industry. Still, representing the most stunning creatures on the planet is all in a day's work for Hamil.

"I have the best job on earth," Hamil states emphatically as appetizers are served."I love what I do. It's such a fun business, always challenging and of course, every day is different. There's never a dull moment." Hamil is the kind of guy who jumps on an internationally-bound jet, ready to sign the next big thing in the form of a goddess who can transform the way we all view beauty. His quest is not without its perks. "I have had meals with Nelson Mandela at the Presidential Palace in Cape Town and have met the most famous and fascinating people everywhere," Hamil reveals in between stories of luminaries he's stewarded like Jerry Hall and so many other bold-face pop icons.

As we dine on the spicy entrées, the restaurant begins buzzing at a higher pitch and Hamil shares his global experiences, Hamil reveals that with his world travels, sometimes the best finds can fall right on the front doorstep at the offices of Mix Model Management. What sounds like a Hollywood Cinderella story can be an exhilarating reality. "The United States of America has the most beautiful girls," Hamil opines. "We are



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ushering in the return of The American Beauty. Second to the U.S., it's Brazil, Australia, Canada, the Czech Republic, and now, China. And yes, I go to all of those places regularly."

"I know it when I see it, but still that's just one-quarter of the whole equation," Hamil comments when asked how he discovers The Look. "A top model needs personality, an agency that believes in her (or him), and even a great deal of luck." The Look the world seeks is transforming, according to Hamil. "It's all transitioning from robotic, super-thin, and being expressionless on the runway," states Hamil. "It's moving toward a healthier, friendlier, more glamorous beauty, again—with personality. It's day-break on the return of the supermodels and because I believe that our new Mix agency can deliver that. I am eager for high-noon."

MODEL BEHAVIOR

Hamil has worked with nearly every supermodel of the last great model era, the 90s, including Naomi Campbell, Christie Brinkley, Stephanie Seymour, Veronica Webb and many more. He has the stories about them all, but his sense of propriety constrains him from revealing all the secrets yet. He's likely saving that for a book that will definitely be a page-turner. When asked about the stereotypical IQ of a model. Hamil is quick to contend, "Yes, I have managed some people who will never win a Nobel Prize, but that's most of us, right? Veronica Webb is one of the most delightfully intelligent people I know. She's a brainiac and represents how much I love smart people."

Neal Hamil is very much in the thick of the bold and the beautiful, creating a new agency instead of making time for inking tomes. He believes some of the most beautiful women on the planet are Texans. "It's all that sunshine, bluebonnets, and big sky," he quips. is one of the most famous women in the world." Hamil has a zero tolerance policy for unethical behavior. "Stand for something or you'll fall for anything, which is why I keep the fashion business at arm's length," he asserts. "It's a job. It's business. Yes, I have been hurt and burned and done wrong and disappointed and all, but I have learned and have found greater happiness because of it." 6)

New is nice, yet there is a creatively fashionable edge to repurposing a vintage garment. It can reflect your own sense of style or individuality to stand out in a crowd. **Texam Mailory Culbert** weighs in with her own affinity of vintage fashion.

AS A PROFESSIONAL WRITER AND actress, I take language and the meanings behind words quite seriously. I also consider what I wear to be a visual extension of who I am on the inside (or am at least striving to be). These are ways that cannot be seen in passing. Ergo, Merriam-Webster's definition of "vintage" as "of old, recognized, and enduring interest, importance, or quality; classic*" sounds like a description of not only what I would like to have on my body, but also what I would like to embody in my heart.

Of course, on a literal level, a second-hand heart is not preferable. Figuratively, though, a vintage heart sounds like it might be quite a safe bet and yet an interesting one as well, tested by time and enriched by experience. Always one to wear my heart on my sleeve, I have found vintage clothing to be my personal style's most vital organ. Some people collect old bottles of nice wine, others classic cars; I collect vintage clothes, but dare I say my closet has a higher calling than any wine cellar or climate-controlled garage because what fills it are not just frocks, they are feelings.

Unlike popping a glass of rare Rothschild at a dinner party or driving a Rolls in the Fourth of July parade, clothes have a function that can suit you every day. A good dress is never over. After centuries it may begin to disintegrate, but I have a jacket from the Marche aux Puces St-Ouen de Clignancourt (known as the big flea market in Paris, of course) that is over two hundred years old and for all its frilly lace and tiny buttons, it keeps me warm. Underneath the decorative touches, there is a utilitarian layer of cotton and velvet caressing the skin. Everyone has-or at least most choose-to get dressed in the morning. A beautiful "have your cake and eat it to" moment can exist in the wearing of vintage pieces in that you can walk around all day, any day, living your life, in something that came before you, can and will most likely remain after you. Yet, while you're in it, be an expression of your taste while fulfilling a need.



Whenever I have worn my 19th-century French jacket from the Paris stage (that is the historic truth), someone inevitably notes it as "Chanel-inspired." The irony. For while it did it come lifetimes before Lagerfeld or even Coco, Chanel was at its onset a truly innovative house of design. It's just that after one hundred years of Vogue, it seems there is nothing new under the sun, and not only has my fitted bodice, puffy-shouldered jacket been done a hundred times (including by Chanel, and it is the exact design she set out to "liberate" women from, so there's one full-circle) but so has Chanel's "ground-breaking" drop-waist dress. So while an "aha" moment is very difficult to achieve in fashion nowadays, there is a "touché" moment that can come about quite easily with vintage pieces.

Another example: I have a gray suede 1960s tunic with white leather detail, and as soon as I saw it, even I, a vintage vivant if you will (though that may translate as a near-oxymoron), thought, "That looks like Tory Burch." As many designers do, Burch humbly admits to her vintage inspiration, and no issue need be taken with her success; I just think there is a joy in "the genuine article" that makes a tunic found by itself more satisfying than a tunic found on a rack with ten identical others and more in the back. Isn't satisfaction what we're all after?

those lucky and For perhaps more evolved folks who are already satisfied, there is still the value of recycling and the virtue of independence. Designers from Forever 21 to Fendi take the artistry of my jacket and the tailoring of my tunic, and they send the "collection" en masse around the world because we live in a world that promotes "new and shiny," even at the expense of quality (ie: Forever 21) or a price (ie: Fendi) that we really can't afford. Along with the fact that it has led to the enabling and encouragement of two major crimes,

sweat shops (again, for instance, Forever 21) and fakes (again, for instance, Fendi), they are selling you trends, and trends fade, usually much more quickly than our conscious mind thinks they will.

If something you buy is already thirty, twenty, even ten years old and you still like it, will it fade or, in a deeper sense, become irrelevant to you? Doubtful. And if you go through your closet for "spring cleaning" and take a bag of clothes you have tired of to Goodwill, what will fill it? Forever 21, most likely, and Fendi will not fill it and not because you wear it all the time. Fendi won't fill it because you remember the price you paid to have something sit in your closet that has neither stood the test of time nor provided memories (other than that possibly painful or guilt-inducing sliding of a credit card). And why? Because you "don't want to get a stain on it." Because it's "too nice to wear." Because you're "saving it for a special occasion." But with vintage, odds are it already has a stain on it, it's already been worn, and every day is a special occasion. That provenance adds to its specialness.

Time is on your side with vintage, and in our harried world, who doesn't want more of that? \odot

age at which many workers will qualify for full Social Security benefits has risen to 67 from 65? Currently, Social Security takes in more in taxes each year than it pays out in benefits. But in 2016, according to estimates by the SSA, the amount of benefits paid out will begin to exceed the amount collected in taxes. Based on SSA projections, by 2037, the Social Security trust fund will be exhausted and payroll taxes collected will be enough to pay only about 73% of benefits owed. Recognition of these issues is growing, and legislators are now looking at funding and investment options to resolve them.

While your Social Security benefits are an important piece of the retirement income equation, you probably shouldn't plan to rely on Social Security alone for your future income. Your employer-sponsored retirement savings plan, company pension and personal savings may need to provide the major portion of your income in retirement.

"Please. We believe in good karma. You've got it, I've got it. Woo has challenged me to pursue my interests and develop good ideas... so tag, you're it."


"I really don't know what to say."



For five decades, the International Debutante Ball Foundation has benefited numerous charities, primarily the Soldiers, Sailors', Marines', Coast Guard and Airmen's Club in New York City, which for over ninety years has provided a home away from home for young men and women of our Armed Forces and those of our Allies. Daughters and granddaughters of United States Presidents and United States representatives have included the three granddaughters and four great-granddaughters of President Eisenhower, both daughters and one granddaughter of President Nixon, two granddaughters of President Johnson and one granddaughter of President Bush. Families of ambassadors, nobility, as well as businessmen and women have all attended the Ball.

While the majority of the debutantes come from the United States, each year about one fourth of the young women come from abroad and form lasting friendships with their American counterparts. As the debutante walked down the center of the Ballroom to make her bow, the orchestra played a song appropriate to the country or state she represents. The Military flag-bearer was provided by the committee while the civilian escort was a young man invited by the debutante or provided by the Ball Committee. Each debutante was accompanied by her own escort in white tie and tails, and a military cadet in dress uniform carried the flag of the country or state which she represents. It was a night of bows, cocktails, dancing and a once-in-a-lifetime experience for the young women and their families and guests. §

Empossibly

The San Antonio-born Texan graced magazine covers, was Revlon's most desired model, and then became a movie star—the American success story. Suzy Parker was also the world's first supermodel, who single-handedly defined elegance and became an icon for an entire generation of post-war women who hungered for the sophistication and prosperity that reflected fashion's New Look from the late 1940s into the 1960s. Here, we reveal how Parker used beauty as her calling card for a life of glamour.

UCH MID-20TH CENTURY luminaries as Avedon, Penn, and Horst photographed Suzy Parker's elegance, which has rarely been duplicated since. She made their jobs easy because the native Texan redhead was known for her striking green eyes, luxurious hair, and high

cheekbones. "I thank God for high cheekbones every time I look into the mirror in the morning," she once commented of her trademark tongue-in-cheek humor. Fashion industry leaders of the era, such as Edie Locke, former editor-in-chief of *Mademoiselle*, viewed Parker as a one-of-a-kind star when she began to model. "A lot of the models are beautiful, but it takes a lot of makeup and this, that, and the other trick to make them look fabulous," Locke once stated. "But, all Suzy had to do was shake out that mane and she'd look fabulous." The late San Antonio resident Nancy Holmes, who often worked with Parker in her fashion career, also felt that the model's thick tresses were one of the key secrets to her success.

More Than a Pretty Face

Born in 1932, as a child of the Depression, to an inventor and his homemaker wife, Cecilia Ann Renee Parker's road to fabulousness started young before she became Suzy Parker. Dorian Leigh, Parker's eldest sister, was the one who first encouraged her curiosity about the modeling world. Leigh had been a magazine cover model superstar since the early 1940s, and in 1947, she introduced her 14-year-old sister to high

fashion by taking her to see now-legendary modeling agent, Eileen Ford. The agent's initial impression was not positive, commenting that, at 5' 9", Parker was too tall to be a successful model, yet she moved forward and began modeling during her summer vacations in New York while visiting her sister. But, Ford finally came around, asserting, "She was the most beautiful creature you can imagine; she was everybody's everything." Diana Vreeland, fashion editor at *Harpers Bazaar* for 25 years and then editor-in-chief of *Vogue*, did not agree with Ford's first reaction and immediately placed Parker in fashion shoots that would chart the course for a successful career beyond her wildest imagination.

Parker's ascent to supermodeldom began, though her appeal transcended mere beauty. In the fickle fashion industry, she garnered acclaim as a true fashion chameleon—she could don a simple, gingham dress for the mainstream cover of *McCall's* and then slip into a voluminous Charles James couture gown for the high fashion cover of *Vogue*, looking completely appropriate in each. As Parker told Andrew Tobias in his tome on Charles Revson's Revlon beauty empire, *Fire & Ice*, "[Revson] thought I should be working for the sheer joy of working for Revlon. I think the reason I was such a good model wasn't that I was such a particular beauty or anything, but that I was as strong as a horse." Yet, after a contract dispute with Revson, the strong-willed model commented, "The next time they wanted me for an ad I said, 'No, thank you.' Then the war was on. He hated me. He absolutely hated me." Regardless, the rest of the world adored Parker and her bewitching beauty and she continued to pose in several other hundred ads over the course of her career beyond Revlon.

After a short while, her national fame shot overseas to the international crowd, making her an international hit. *The London Times* even called her "the epitome of the new American woman: healthy, assured, and in charge of her life." Because of Parker's flexible style, a fashion editor of the time also observed that Parker "was like a girl you might glimpse in between planes at DeGaulle, wearing only a trench coat, with a mysterious secret." She was more than just a symbol to women. Parker was the kind of women that most Med Men-era males wanted to take for, in the vernacular of the times, a moonlit swim.

The Most Beautiful Woman in the World

With her sparkling green eyes offset by slouch hats and a slew of Coco Chanel classic numbers, Parker inspired millions of women to aspire to her perfectly proportioned figure. Christian Dior went so far as to name her "the most beautiful woman in the world." Yet, she was so much more than met the eyes. "Suzy Parker gave















emotion and reality to the history of fashion photography," photographer Richard Avedon once explained. "She invented the form, and no one has surpassed her." All it took was one look at an Avedon / Parker collaboration to glimpse her true mystique. "Suzy Parker's imagination

and ability to perform to Richard Avedon's imagination and direction was brilliant," veteran photographer Victor Skrebneski shares. "Their photographs will always remain the first original high fashion statements of their time."

The high fashion life is exactly what Parker sought. As she once said about herself, she wanted "a life in pursuit of fun, bright lights and career." In 1952, she became the star in Chanel's stable of mannequins as the designer's signature face. The silver-haired Carmen Dell'Orefice, *Carmen* as she is still widely known, graced the cover of *Brilliant's* March 2007 issue and after seven decades of modeling, she likely knew best what working with Parker was really like. She understands that Parker gained fame as an international celebrity, which before her, was reserved for only movie stars and royalty. "She was a Southern beauty to behold: tall, lanky, with a million dollar dimpled cheek smile, she implemented



her success by her self-confidence and intelligence... and that unrelentingly scathing wit," reflects Dell'Orefice.

Of course, that elusive essence led to her financial success, too. In the 1950s, when successful career women were much less common and when women regularly earned 30 cents on the dollar of what any man earned in the same position, Parker soon rose to the top of her field as the world's highest paid model, earning \$100,000 a year (accumulated from \$200-an-hour photo sittings) and posing for over 60 magazine covers and several hundred advertisements. She appeared in everything from a cover story in Life in 1957 to the cover of Esquire in 1961, and offered something for everyone. Parker's face was so ubiquitous that she was the first fashion model to reach status as a household name. When she posed in one of fashion's first bikini shots while visiting the French Riviera, it was the shot heard 'round the fashion world.

In the mid-1950s, as she tried to move beyond the constraints of the fashion world, Parker worked behind the camera for a time, apprenticing at the Paris studio of famed art photographer Henri Cartier–Bresson, before working as an editor for French Vogue. She continued to

model in Paris, Rome, London, and New York and even became the inspiration for a film that would change her life.

New York to Hollywood

Naturally, Hollywood soon beckoned. In 1957, while at her modeling career's zenith, Parker made her Tinsletown debut in the musical *Funny Face*, starring Fred Astaire and Audrey Hepburn. The film parodied fashion magazines and French couture and she performed in a number called "Think Pink," which spoofed fashion editors such as her mentor, Diana Vreeland. It is interesting to note that Hepburn's character in Stanley Donen's musical comedy was loosely based on Parker and her professional relationship with Richard Avedon, with Astaire in the Svengali-esque Avedon role. The film symbolizes the best of high fashion in that era, and Hepburn and Parker became pals during the shoot. In fact, Hepburn became such a cheerleader that Parker called the swan-like actress her "Hollywood








press agent." Perhaps Parker and film were a match made in heaven. "Suzy Parker didn't stop talking when I first tried to take her picture," superstar fashion photographer Horst P. Horst once remarked. "So, I said, 'You keep talking,' and I left. When she got into the movies, I joked that maybe she would do for the movies what she would never do for me—to hold still."

Parker's first major role was opposite the legendary Cary Grant in *Kiss Them for Me*, also released in 1957. Jayne Mansfield played the female lead and the film proved an effective tool to display Parker's graceful good looks. "I watched myself on the screen with a sort of frozen horror," Parker said at the time, "And, I wasn't at all surprised to learn it had a similar effect on the audience." Announcing that she intended to become a good actress "if it kills me," Parker moved on to other redeeming roles that lured audiences of the time. "Parker's trademark in photographs and later on the movie screen was icy sophistication, often likened to that of Grace Kelly," wrote *New York Times* writer Douglas Martin. "But in person she exuded a girl– next–door prettiness and a sort of wacky loquaciousness. Her thespian talents were not always favored by critics, but she was considered in New York and Hollywood circles to be entertaining, funny, and possess a meaningful intellect."

In 1958, she co-starred with Gary Cooper in *Ten North Frederick*, in the role of Cooper's much younger girlfriend, and with their torrid May-December affair, she costs him his family. To cap off the decade, she appeared in 1959's *The Best of Everything*, a costume-laden melodrama, co-starring Hope Lange, Joan Crawford and Robert Evans, in which she played a secretary trying to become an actress. In that film, her character's lines







summed up her life at the time: "The only thing I want is to be free, to have no ties. To have, to hold, and then, to let go. Here's to men: bless their clean cut faces and dirty little minds."


Best Wife and Mother Her 1960 film, *Circle of Deception*, would change her life by introducing her to her co-star and future husband, Bradford Dillman, whom she married three years later. Parker later undertook guest spots on popular television shows such as *Twilight Zone, Burke's Law, Chrysler Theatre,* and other popular shows of TV's golden era. "She acted through the still camera brilliantly, but when she acted in front of the moving camera she was not so free and comfortable," reveals her stepdaughter, Pamela Dillman Harman. "She said she wasn't the actress she wanted to be, so she decided, 'OK, I'm going to give up on this and devote my talents to being the best wife and mother,' and she really was that."

A Helluva Life

Moments from Parker's past, though, are as inexplicable as her beauty. While engaged to actor and model Gardner McKay in1956, they were returning from Paris on the ocean liner 'Ile de France' and the ship stopped to pick up survivors of the Andrea Doria, the luxury ocean liner shipwreck that made international news at the time. In a terrible car accident in 1958, she broke both her arms and her father was killed when the car collided with a train in Saint Augustine, Florida. It was also revealed that, at 17, she had eloped from high school to marry a childhood sweetheart, Charles Staton. Later, it emerged that Parker had also been secretly married since 1955 to a French journalist and novelist, Pierre La Salle. However, it did not last, and they divorced in 1961. As Parker telling one interviewer, "Being married to a Frenchman is interesting-you hardly ever see your husband." Parker once commented to a reporter that she believed the institution of marriage destroys love.

"All Suzy really wanted was love and a big family, which she finally achieved," confided Dell'Orifice to us. Parker had escaped the jaded outcomes of other stellar models of her era and the Dillmans moved from Los Angeles to Montecito in 1968 to live a quieter life with their children. Together, they raised six children: Ms. Parker's daughter Georgia from her marriage to La Salle, two children from Dillman's previous relationship, and the three children they had together—Dinah, Charles, and Christopher.

Suzy Parker passed away in May 2003 at the age of 70 following a history of ill health and medical problems that included respiratory problems, diabetes and hip surgery. But despite her early passing, Parker proved that it's better to savour youth while at its height, than to live it dully until the age of 100. She summed up her life best in a quote she gave to a journalist in the mid 1950s, "I don't tell lies; I merely embellish stories—the truth is so dull." One aspect of her life remains undeniably true; her life and beauty were anything but dull, and it continues to perpetuate the theory that many of the most beautiful women in the world are from Texas.



Battle of Flowers Parade Is Where San Antonio's Fiesta Began

HEN IT COMES TO CELEBRAtions, San Antonio is the epicenter of civic conviviality as Fiesta San Antonio hosts over 100 events packed into 11-days of non-stop merriment. Every facet in the bejeweled city's creative crown shines brightly as community leaders, shop keepers, senior citizens, school children and guests from all over the world don Fiesta finery, display an array of Fiesta medals proudly on colorful sashes, affix faux tiaras to quaffs of big hair and take to the streets in an unrivaled revelry that began in 1891.

The grandmother of all Fiesta events, rather, the Grande Dame event, began in April 1891 to honor the men of the Alamo and those that fought for Texas independence at the Battle of San Jacinto. It started, as most well-planned events do, with a group of women.

"I am absolutely elated to take the baton from the hands of those that have so diligently led the Battle of Flowers Parade through its 122 years of success," says this year's newly elected president, Anne Ballantyne. "It is thrilling to have seen the college students who have just competed in our Oratorical Contest that began in 1926 and exciting to think that over 3,500 high school students will perform a mass musical performance at our 75th Band festival."

By 1890, San Antonio was a thriving trade center with a population of 38,000. In 1891 a group of citizens decided to honor the heroes of the Alamo and Battle of San Jacinto with a Battle of Flowers. It is said that a Mr. Ballard asked a group of prominent ladies why there had never been a parade in San Antonio. Ellen Maury Slayden, who was born at the Maury family home, Piedmont, in Charlottesville, Virginia, in 1860; moved to San Antonio in 1883, as the bride of James Luther Slayden, a merchant and rancher in San Antonio. She had attended a wonderful affair in Venice where ladies rode in elaborately decorated carriages and pelted each other with spring flowers, which inspired her greatly. Mrs. Slayden served for a time in 1889 as society editor of the San Antonio Express newspaper and she and the ladies involved adopted the idea for the first Battle of Flowers Parade held April 21, 1891. The first parade had horse-drawn carriages, bicycles decorated with fresh flowers and floats carrying children dressed as flowers. The Belknap Rifles represented the military. The participants pelted each other with blossoms, just like in Venice.

The Battle of Flowers was an immediate success. On the tenth anniversary of the parade, it was reported in the Express-News that the parade was the first in the nation to have a horseless vehicle. By that time, more events were taking place on or near April 21—a carnival, balls and coronations of "royalty." The tradition of Fiesta Royalty is almost as old as Fiesta itself. The first queen, Ida Archer, was selected in 1896. But, there was quite a stir amongst the local ladies because she was from Austin – of all places – and not San Antonio.

For well over a century, parade patrons have lined the downtown streets of San Antonio for the oldest and largest parade of Fiesta San Antonio, attracting crowds of more than 350,000. Spectacular flower-covered floats with participants adorned in colorful costumes, giant helium balloons, horse drawn carriages, antique cars, uniformed military cavalcades in precision march, high school floats, pep squads, cheerleaders and marching bands from near and far stimulate the crowds with enthusiastic entertainment at every turn.

The parade has assisted countless thousands with its largesse. As the only parade in the United States produced entirely by women, all of whom are volunteers,




















the Battle of Flowers Association has supported the educational, artistic, social and philanthropic achievements of their community's youth with sponsorship of parade entries for area high schools, parade and band festival art contests, essay contests for area teens, collegiate oratorical competitions, band competitions, children's charities parade watching celebrations and by affording nonprofit organizations the opportunity to raise funds for worthy causes with over 45,000 parade seats sold by charities along the parade route each year.

"Celebrations," the 2013 Battle of Flowers Parade theme will fete about 200 parade entries with dazzling floats and flower covered carriages depicting world festivals, heritages and anniversaries. "We encourage all of our friends in Texas and beyond to join us in celebrating our world," says Battle of Flowers parade vice president Donna Vaughan. "In addition to our own observance, we will be showcasing the celebrations of other countries with spectacularly decorated floats and colorfully costumed parade participants." During the Association's annual "Float Picking Party," eight area public high school organizations are given an opportunity each year to participate in the themed celebration with a float produced and paid for by the Battle of Flowers Association, and a stipend given to each group for costuming and props. Celebrations to be brought to the streets during the 2013 parade will represent a global influence, including Mexico's Cinco De Mayo, Spain's Running of the Bulls, Brazil's Rio Carnival, Australia's Flower Festival, Children's Day in Japan, and India's Pushkar Camel Fair.

Always an attraction, the Queen and Princess of the Order of the Alamo and their court of in-town and visiting duchesses resplendent in elaborately jeweled dresses and trains - some 15 feet long - riding atop fairy-tail like floats produce cheers from the crowds along the parade route. For all of the pomp and pageantry, the most sought after appeal is for the young ladies to "show us your shoes!" The stylish ladies of the court often wear cowboy boots, slippers, tennis shoes or other foot wear that they have decorated with rhinestones to match the gorgeous gowns. One duchess donned a pair of Kermit The Frog house slippers with ruby red rhinestone eyes and green glittered body that matched the deep emerald green of her Fiesta frock.

Platoons of marching bands, cavalry and cadets keep parade patrons entertained with pulsating rhythms and precision steps. Jamie Bloodsworth, a member of the Battle of Flowers Association recalls a story told about her late father, Robert Killian, by one of his Texas A&M Corp of Cadet peers. It seems that Killian and his buddies were bringing up the rear of a marching formation during a 1950s Battle of Flowers Parade. As they passed the Southern Jewelry Company on Alamo Plaza, the cadets broke rank, ran through the front of the shop and out the back over the loading dock just as the brigade rounded the corner. They never missed a beat. **(5)**







HIS YEAR JANELL KLEBERG WAS honored by the South Texas Charity Weekend as their South Texan of the Year. This distinguished honor has in past years been bestowed on individuals such as Nolan Ryan of Dallas, Peter and Juliana Holt of San Antonio, Barry Andrews of Dallas, Frank Horlock of Riviera, Gary and Ollabelle Hall of Houston, Dan and Carolyn Pedrotti of Corpus Christi, Bill and Judy Colston of Riviera, and last but not least, her husband Tio Kleberg of Kingsville. The common thread among these people is their love for South Texas and their philanthropy toward it, especially their undeniable support for wildlife conservation, ranch management, and better health care for a rural region of Texas.

Janell Kleberg is honored for good reason. After graduating from Texas Tech University and an Army tour of duty in El Paso, she and Tio settled in Kingsville Texas in 1971 where they became engaged in the business affairs of King ranch and the local community—and raised their 3 children Chris, Adrian, and Jay. Janell was the driving force behind many significant achievements in civic affairs such as La Posada-A Parade of lights and a Celebration of Christmas, nature tourism, and restoration of the Flato Opera House. In the business affairs of King Ranch and Kingsville, she developed marketing and catalog strategies for the King Ranch Saddle Shop, a world-renowned business venture. Her magnificent eye and passion for photography resulted in an award-winning book, *Waiting for Daylight*, which captured King Ranch during an era now passed, as some of these images depict.


For pleasure she worked cattle with the vaqueros on the King Ranch, rode two-year colts to settle them down, participated in NCHA Cutting Horse competition nation-wide. Kleberg also honed her shooting skills such that she is legendary in her ability to hit wild quail on the covey rise with a .410 shotgun. It was in education and university affairs where Kleberg made her most significant impact. Her desire to help others came with her first job as a schoolteacher. Her first involvement was to work with Texas A&M University - Kingsville to write and produce a musical comedy "Tales of the Wild Horse Desert" with the university's theatre department, which raised scholarships for theatre majors for many years. Later, she led the charge to create Academy High School on the campus of Texas A&M University-Kingsville. This program was a laboratory school that now graduates high school students, many with at least one to two semesters of college credit and some with an Associate's Degree.

Similar to her mother-in-law Mary Lewis Kleberg, who served on the South Texas University Board of Regents, Janell Kleberg's early involvement WAS in the university's charitable foundation. This placed her in a position to see the actual proposal submitted by Dr. Charles DeYoung in 1980 which gelled into the Caesar Kleberg Wildlife Research Institute, after receiving approval from the Caesar Kleberg Foundation for Wildlife Conservation in 1981.

The Trustees of the Caesar Kleberg Foundation at the time were Leroy Denman Jr., Duane Leach, and Tio Kleberg. Without knowing what was to come, this fledgling Institute set the stage for what then was a regional teaching college and helped transform it into one of the top research universities in Texas. "We are very proud of our University for being in the Top 10 in research funding among all public universities in Texas", said Dr. Steve Tallant, President. "With great support from people like Janell Kleberg, who serves on our President's Leadership Council, we are poised to reach even loftier goals as a research institution".

Kleberg's life-long experiences with the nature has driven her to support wildlife research which she believes is fundamental to conservation of the 600+ wildlife species that live all or part of the year in South Texas. Species like the endangered ocelot is one such species on the brink of extinction in the U.S. and Dr. Michael Tewes, the Frank Yturria Chair in Wild Cat Studies, has been working with ocelots since 1981 and has become a world renowned expert on wild cats. His research began with North American cats like cougars, bobcats and ocelots and now includes his work with African lions and Thailand snow leopards. "I have been blessed to spend my career at the Caesar Kleberg Wildlife Research Institute working on wild cats," Mike Tewes said. "This has been my dream job since I was a boy growing up in South Texas."

The migratory species also depend on the lower Texas coast for their survival as they migrate from nesting grounds in Canada and the northern U.S. to faraway places like Costa Rica and Argentina. One of the most exciting projects to date has uncovered the incredible number of birds and bats that hug the lower Texas coast on their migration routes. "The number of birds and bats that we have recorded with our radar units is more than four times what has been recorded anywhere else in North America," remarked Dr. Bart Ballard, a world-class wetland bird and waterfowl specialist at the Institute. "My graduate students have done ground-breaking work and I am very proud of them for their commitment to the Institute and its mission." Ballard holds the prestigious C. Berdon and Rolanette Lawrence Chair in Waterfowl Research.



Kleberg beams with pride as she has witnessed the growth and development of the research and education ongoing at Texas A&M University-Kingsville. Research programs like The Natural Toxin Center, Environmental Engineering, and Chemistry are nationally known entities for the science they produce. Educational programs such as a world class Music Department, Biomedical Science (which feeds into the Pharmacy School on campus), Fashion Merchandizing, Human

Nutrition, and Doctorate Programs in Education, Wildlife Science, Agronomy, and Environmental Science make her proud. Interesting to note is that The King Ranch Institute for Ranch Management is the only Master's degree program in the world in ranch management. Javelina Pride is the motto of TAMU-Kingsville and we are surprised Kleberg didn't coin that phrase because she certainly lives it every day of her life.

It is South Texas Charity Quail Hunt's where Kleberg, along with her husband Tio, a small group of dedicated volunteers and the phenomenal generosity of King Ranch, have all made their greatest impact. This charity event has raised over \$9 million since its beginning. Lives have been changed in this underserved region of South Texas. Emergency medical care is available, with donations from the charity event focused on a new Emergency Room, a new Trauma Center in Kingsville's Christus Spohn Hospital. By helping Halo-Flight provide emergency ambulance service, the helicopter can go where no ambulance on four wheels can. The added support for wildlife conservation and ranch management make this charity event one of the most unique and special events in our great state.

The final measure is how their children see her impact. Janell Kleberg is described by her daughter Adrian, and sons Chris and Jay, "We have an appreciation for our Mother's unwavering dedication and service to her family and community. She has a unique gift for articulating a vision and bringing diverse groups of people together to make that vision a reality. We were fortunate to grow up in a hard working, innovative culture that she and our father cultivated at King Ranch. In her words 'Life in South Texas is a great adventure, fueled by a passion for the native habitats, livestock and wildlife. It is shared by those who live each day with a sense of wonder in all creation." \odot







SAN ANTONIO-BASED RUIZ-HEALY ART announced the inauguration of its new gallery space in New York City this winter, with the opening of Refined Abundance, an exhibition by renowned Mexican painter Pedro Diego Alvarado-Rivera, whose formal education began in Mexico City at the National School of Painting and Sculpture. From there he continued at the Academy of San Carlos, a school intimately linked to the birth and proliferation of Mexican Modernism. His studies continued in Paris at l'Ecole Nationale Supérieure des Beaux Arts, and with world-renowned photographer and artist Henri Cartier-Bresson, where he studied drawing and painting. He also worked as an apprentice in the lithography studio of Clot Bramsen et Georges.





Alvarado-Rivera extended his personal study throughout the 1980s back in Mexico, where he studied landscape with Maestro Jesus Gallardo in Guanajuato, and enhanced his own studio practice through apprenticeships with Maestros Ricardo Martinez and Vlady in Mexico City. In 1994, he perfected his skills further through a London apprenticeship with one of the greats of Latin American painting, Maestro Armando Morales. Alvarado-Rivera's have been described as "unapologetically pictorial formal explorations in paint of a focused portion of the visible world."

Refined Abundance's exhibition, which runs through April, iss presented by Ruiz-Healy Art to make Alvarado-Rivera's work available to collectors and admirers in the U.S., and is held in parallel to a major retrospective exhibit of the artist's work that iss on display at the Museo San Ildefonso in Mexico City. Ruiz-Healy Art offered advance copies of the book Form and Metaphor, an extensive look at Alvarado-Rivera's work, to compliment the exhibition opening in Mexico City. Ruiz-Healy Art has operated a space in San Antonio since 2006, and is thrilled to have a second location in New York City.
