Dear Ms. Modern Manners,

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





COLOR YOURSELF ENLIGHTENED

What color is happiness? Ever felt a strong connection to colors that can change how you feel in an instant? Austin-based Resonance Repatterning Practitioner, Mary Schneider shares insight on how color can enhance the world around us

COLOR, MEET LIGHT

Substantial research shows that color matters, indeed plays a pivotal role in our visual experiences and lives. When it is imbalanced we experience disconnection and bonding stress. The acupuncturist told me, "You have a weak heart. Eat red food." I had been eating apples and strawberries, pomegranates, and any red food I could find, and my angina never returned, thus I became a true believer.

COLOR AND CHAKRAS

The Indian Ayurvedic Chakra system also employs color as a major element of its healing structure. For instance, the colors that heal the heart chakra are pink and green. Many years ago, a client walked in my door dressed from head to toe in pink and green. It was as if they were holding a neon sign that said, "I have a broken heart." Sure enough, what came up was a session to help heal a shattered heart.

Much of the research in the area of color therapy was performed by Indian doctor Colonel Dinshah P. Ghadiali, MD, born in 1873. He immigrated to the United States with his wife and two children, and called this therapy Spectro-Chrome. The equipment we use in Resonance Repatterning for light therapy comes from the Dinshah Health Society in Malaga, NJ. We primarily focus on the following colors: scarlet, red, orange, yellow, lime, green, turquoise, blue, purple, indigo, violet, magenta and pink. 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KEEPING YOUR BEAT



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WHERE PARENTING STANDS

When Dr. Daniel Kahneman, cognitive psychologist and father of behavioral economics, surveyed working women in the United States, he asked them to rate their enjoyment of various activities in their lives. Out of 15 items, "time with children" ranked 14th, after housework. In the same study, working mothers ranked "intimate relationships" and "socializing outside of work" as the two most enjoyable events.

It would stand to reason that engaging in conversation that has depth and intimacy allows someone to feel understood and accepted for being themselves. It would stand to reason that in socializing with her friends, a mother would feel the freedom to be self-expressive, to be herself. In the same study, they found that fathers seemed to express more positive feelings about parenting. Many fathers are more playful in their parenting. Fathers seem to bring more of their authentic selves into their parenting. Are mothers not themselves when they are parenting?

The study suggests that women feel a sense of inadequacy when it comes to their ability to parent well. Mothers may overthink things. It's not uncommon that they second-guess themselves. They vacillate with rules and following through on consequences because they are afraid to make mistakes. Mothers are more apt to compare themselves to other mothers and feel that they are not as effective. Some have come to trust the latest parenting information instead of only trusting their intuition.

Being your authentic self is not just a nice gesture in sincerity. The quest for authenticity is a visceral pursuit of our hearts. William Shakespeare's intertwined his wisdom and life maxims in his plays. One of Shakespeare's most recognized verses is from Hamlet, spoken ironically by Polonius: "This above all: to thine own self be true, and it must follow, as the night the day, Thou canst not then be false to any man..."

Perhaps the quotidian aspects of parenting contribute to a mother losing her sense of self. Perhaps feeling insecure about parenting and seeking to emulate others might contribute to a loss of self. Perhaps, in the quest for perfect parenting, a mother's true self is subsumed by whom she perceives she needs to be. But it doesn't need to be this way.

DeBakey credited much of his success to his mother, Raheeja Debaghi, for teaching him to sew, crochet, and knit. His father, Shaker Debaghi, also had a strong influence on him because he owned a pharmacy in which the younger DeBakey worked. It was there that he was inspired to become a doctor because of the interactions that he had with the doctors who frequented the pharmacy. His father shared of himself, in his most natural way, in his most natural setting. Had Debakey's parents expended energy in trying to provide perfect parenting instead of having the simple approach of parenting and loving as their authentic selves the world might not have ever benefited from his greatness.

THE GREATEST GIFT OF ALL

What is *your* greatest gift? You are the unique, best, and original version of yourself. Striving to be someone other than whom you are only creates a second- rate version of the person you are emulating. Not allowing yourself to be authentic and give of yourself in that way, deprives the world of your true gifts. Nothing happens by coincidence. Who you truly are is who your children truly need. Joan of Arc said, "one life is all we have, and we live it as we believe in living it. However, to sacrifice what you are and to live without belief, that is a fate more terrible than dying." That in mind, being your true self will always be the best path possible. Your children, friends, and everyone you influence will be better for it, and you'll gain so much more enjoyment from your parenting and personal life. **S**

THE NEXT BIG THING

Native Texan Brandon Maxwell is making a splash in the world of high fashion. From being Lady Gaga's stylist to creating his own collection that is a favorite of famous celebs and Sociables alike, he reveals to our chronicler of style Lance Avery Morgan what it's like to be the newest and most dynamic talent on the scene

BORN CREATIVE

f you had a crystal ball and could conjure fashion's future, the image of Brandon Maxwell might just appear quite vividly. The native Texan's intense relationship with modern chic is one for the books. With today's Snapchatequivalent of ephemeral fashion designers coming and going, count on him to be in it for the long haul – and to take home the prize. In fact, Maxwell, who turns 31 this month, recently

won the coveted CFDA Swarovski Award for Womenswear. He loves designing for a woman's body; in fact, he cuts on it. "I don't sketch," Brandon Maxwell con des in our conversation about life, Texas and the pursuit of fashion in advance of his appearance in Austin. He will be there speaking at the Women's Symphony League fashion show and luncheon, where the theme is *Texas Women – Past, Present & Future* on Friday, September 23, as a part of the organization's annual Jewel Ball festivities.

In fact, when Lady Gaga took to the stage to perform the rousing musical tribute this year to *The Sound of Music* at the 87th Academy Awards, she was wearing a white tulle creation designed by Maxwell. His work as Gaga's stylist is almost as acclaimed as her musical accomplishments. Their creative partnership, as he calls it, got him

to right here, right now by way of a winding route from East Texas. To the kid from Longview, Texas who read every *Vogue* he could get his hands on... it's a place that is in his heart even when he is not there, he told me. Much like the town's intersecting highways that converge north of the Sabine River, Maxwell has evolved from being a stylist into a full-fledged fashion designer. *Forbes* magazine called Longview the sixth fastest-growing small

city, and style experts are just as bullish regarding Maxwell's fashion business prospects. The Next Big Thing he may well be, and like all great stories, it had to start somewhere.

ROOTS OF STYLE

His grandmother worked in a boutique in town, Riff's, and Brandon spent as much time as possible there, learning. "She and my mother were my style icons. I mean, my own life is not that stylish or super glam," Maxwell muses. "I like to be surrounded by strong women. I've always been really focused on them." He goes on to say, "It started with my grandmother's store that included high-end furs and jewelry dressing rooms. She laid out clothes, head to toe, so I learned to be a stylist by watching and seeing what women loved and what they were



insecure about. It's not about me. It's about them." Even though it was a small town, people were very knowledgeable about style. Maxwell's parents went out frequently, and he recalled his mother coming down stairs dressed up. "Even though I am in New York now, it still feels like I am in Texas with these memories," he recalls.

Maxwell is quick to share how much he loves Texas, and Austin, where he counts his sister and many friends as his ties. He attended St. Edward's University where he studied photography and continued to hone his stylist eye. "My own style is different in Austin. There's so much going on there, but I'm all about shorts and queso when I visit. It's one of the best cities in the world," he confesses. The Live Music Capital of the World also influences his collections, "I create my collections with music," he reveals. "The two weeks after a previous collection I'll hibernate and create."

That creative process is never-ending. "Going from stylist to designer was easy for me," Maxwell shares. "They go hand in hand. Listen, I didn't go to design school so my career as a stylist is a master class." He learned by observing the fashion design world in real time, in real life. He quickly learned to absorb everything he studied, and the transition from stylist to designer was surprisingly easy. But he still had to play the part, and project a confidence that was still in fledgling form. "Believe me, it was terrifying at the time," he confesses. "I told myself I'd take the leap before I reached 30. A lot of the people wearing my clothes were stylist friends who I knew in my career, so that helped, too."

CELEB CACHÈ

In the real world of top celeb clients and high stakes-high level design, I ask him about what is inspiring his new collection that will be all black and white. "It's not referential, meaning my designs don't change by the season," he states emphatically. "It never starts with a theme. I am inspired by women throughout history and in my life. The clothes are shape- centered, sculptural and made on the woman." Unlike other designers, he doesn't sketch his designs. "Colors, shapes and the cut reflect where I am in my life. I start with making things on the body and a few months into it, it all comes together with cohesion. I never start with a theme since each collection is an extension of the one before it. My client can get something similar in this new collection that she loved before with what I do."



Maxwell's line in stores like Saks Fifth Avenue, Bergdorf Goodman, Jeffrey, among other chic destinations. Yet, he's quick to point out he's still new in the business. "I'm not a mass market brand yet, so it's a personal connection to me. I know sales teams. When a woman is trying something on I am there to zip her up. Since I've been a stylist for many years the point is to go in and do something with the hem here, or tighten this there. It's really important to get feedback. I ask my client: What do *you* want to feel like? A woman should feel good when she walks out the door." That connectivity applies to his bold face-named clients, too. "It means everything to me. For every woman who has worn my clothes I've had a personal connection with them.



Maxwell is not only influenced by the women in his family, modern fashion icons, and also by one Lynn Wyatt of Houston. Wyatt, known and chronicled extensively for her tremendous sense of style. "I called her and asked if she'd appear at my first collection. Although she is not a client, she sent a great message that we played at the start of the show and it was a dream come true" recalls Maxwell. "Women in Texas inform my collections. With my collections, I start simple and clean, and that progress to more-is-more toward the end of the show and the skirts get bigger."

CHANGE ARTIST

In fact, Maxwell's attention to more-is-more creativity happened recently at the Metropolitan Museum of Art's Costume Ball in May with supermodel Karli Kloss who wanted versatility for the evening for her choice of a dress. As most know, there's the presentation, or red carpet, dress that is photographed by jillions of paparazzi and beamed across the world at the beginning of the evening. Then there's the let'shave-fun and sexier after-party dress change.

The cameras snapped away when Kloss arrived in Maxwell's architecturally-inspired white gown, a type of cloak, that covered her shoulders and highlighted her slim waist. For Act II, in what seemed like moments, she appeared in an even sleeker silhouette, one that had

a choker neckline, waist cut-outs and a more well, décolleté. Cut to Act III, post gala where Maxwell takes his scissors and pristine point of view, transforming the evening gown into a get-down min dress. It's convertible clothing at its best and clearly defines the designer's skill. Fittingly, since the evening's theme as fashion in the age of technology, Kloss's and Maxwell's teams created the triumvirate through Facetime and Skype, of course. Some might call that evening a career triumph. For Maxwell, it was just another Monday night... and a dream come true.

That kind of versatility hasn't been seen since the heyday of Yves St. Laurent, Halston and Geoffrey Beene. When he won the CFDA award, his humility was evident, similar to how he approaches life. "I'm a slightly overweight boy from Texas, where my idea of a fine meal is something rolled into a ball and deep fried," said Maxwell. "I was so nervous about putting on pants that weren't elastic waist...and that there would be three forks at dinner and I would use the wrong one. But I'd like to thank my father who manages my business, and my mother, who always tells me I'm doing awesome even when I'm not." The award was presented, fittingly, by Karli Kloss.

MOTIVATION BY DESIRE

When I ask Maxwell if he has a favorite thing, a touchstone, that keeps

this meteoric rise in perspective, he's quick to note, "I don't have a particular possession, but it would be my family. They are a great motivator. We're one large family and they go everywhere with me. They inspire me to push myself forward and making them proud since I chose a non-traditional career. If I'm not with them, I talk to them every day."

Asked if he has any advice for aspiring designers, he's emphatic when stating, "Have conviction in yourself and do what you want to do. Everyone will have an opinion. If your name is on it, take responsibility for what you do and what it represents." He goes on to say, "I'm grateful. Before the Internet the only way I saw fashion was pouring over the magazines at the grocery store. Some other kid can see me do it and think they can do it themselves, too." Regarding the magazines he used as a fashion resource, when asked what his favorite era in fashion was that he wishes he'd been attached to, Maxwell is quick to note, "The 80s when I was born. I'd also loved to have been in New York during the Warhol 60s, but essentially I love the here and now. Moving forward. Fashion is always moving forward."

DALMATIA'S DELIGHTS

What do men's neckties, Dalmatians and the white stones used for the White House have in common? They all come from Croatia.

The cravat, a precursor of the modern necktie, was first worn by 17th century Croat soldiers who were mercenaries in France. It is speculated that the term cravat derives from the French cravat, a corrupt French pronunciation of Croate. Every year Cravat Day is celebrated on October 16. (Wikipedia)

The Dalmatian dog breed traces its roots back to Croatia and the historical region of Dalmatia. The Dalmatian was initially used as a "dog of war" to guard the borders of Dalmatia. It is often known as a firehouse mascot because it was easily trained to run in front of horse-drawn carriages to clear a path and guide the horses and firefighters to fires. It also protected firehouses and equipment from theft.


The White House in Washington, D.C. gleams with white limestone, which was harvested from the quarries on Brac Island in central Dalmatia. Roman Emperor Diocletian used the same white stone to build his palace in Split, Croatia, in the fourth century. Today, Diocletian's Palace is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and is considered by many historians to be one of the best preserved Roman structures in the world. Diocletian's Palace was used as a location for filming the fourth season of the HBO series *Game of Thrones*.

When I was a little girl, I remember my mother talking about Dubrovnik often. She described it as absolutely magical and her most favorite city in the world. I did not give Dubrovnik too much thought then and was clueless where to find it on a map or how to spell it, but years later, I knew I wanted to visit the city that Lord Byron called *The Pearl of the Adriatic*. Bucket list or not, my plans to visit were delayed over the decades by the fall of Yugoslavia, the War for Croatia and the troubles in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Now that travel to Croatia and Montenegro is deemed safe and my interest enhanced by the prospect of sailing in the Adriatic and exploring the area's rich cultural heritage, my husband Allan, a history buff, and I signed on with Windstar for a Dalmatian Coast cruise. We bookended the trip with a few days in Rome at the start and a few days in Venice at the end. We chose Windstar because its yachts carry fewer than 300 passengers and can sail into ports that cannot accommodate the big cruise ships.

EMBARK UPON ENCHANTMENT

We began our voyage from Civitavecchia (near Rome), sailed to Capri, then Sicily, followed by a day at sea, and then woke up to the splendors of Kotor. Soaring Montenegrin mountains (almost black in appearance - hence the name Montenegro), breathtaking fjord-like views with sparkling blue and green water and medieval stone structures with red roof tops greeted us. We visited Old Kotor, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, which was developed within a small triangular area enclosed by walls and structures built by the Venetians from the 15th to mid-18th centuries. No cars are allowed on the streets. We admired Baroque palaces and Romanesque churches before we joined a motor coach tour that took us on






a 25-switchback serpentine frighteningly steep road to Loveen Mountain. That we didn't fall off the cliff when another motor coach passed us is a miracle, and a real credit to the driver.

We stopped in the picturesque village of Njegusi where we dined on Dalmatian pršut (Croatian

prosciutto), cheese and "black wine" (actually a regional red), and noticed central to the bar and surrounded by a variety of vodka in different bottle shapes and sizes, a large picture of Vladimir Putin, a reminder that Russia had and has a stake in Montenegro. Our tour then took us to the town of Cetinje to visit the Museum of King Nikola. En route, our proud Montenegrin guide pointed to many vacant buildings in disrepair, noting that prior to Serbian rule, they were prosperous factories. We then drove to the popular summer resort of the Bud'va Riviera with its alluring beaches and then back to Kotor where we went to the 12th century Cathedral of St. Triphon to light candles for loved ones, something we did in every city we visited.

DAZZLING DUBROVNIK

My mother was right: Dubrovnik is stunning, magical and awesome with marble and cobblestone streets, orange-tiled rooftops, Gothic, Renaissance and Baroque buildings, art and artifacts from a rich cultural history and impressive medieval stone walls and forts that encompass the Old City -- also designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site. We took the four-minute cable car ride to Mt. Sr for a 360-degree view of the city and we were enchanted by the scenery - the shim-

mering, clear blue Adriatic, Lokrum Island and the Elafiti Islands on the horizon. Although we didn't visit Lokrum Island, it is reputed to be a wonderful place to swim and kayak. Lokrum Island also has a monastery built in the 12th century by Benedictine monks who lived there for the next six hundred years. In 1859, Maximillian, Emperor of Mexico, made it

his holiday home. We wore comfortable shoes for a walk around Dubrovnik's famous walls and brought water with us. The walk is a must but it is strenuous with a lot of steps. We paid attention to the rooftops because we were told that the bright orange terracotta tiles are replacements for tiles that were damaged or destroyed by shells during the 1990s war. Dubrovnik suffered considerable damage during the war. Shells struck 68 percent of the buildings in Old Town, and left holes in two out of every three tiled roofs. Fortunately, most buildings are now repaired and restored. We visited the Franciscan Monastery & Museum and saw the artillery that penetrated the monastery walls. We also visited the pharmacy in the monastery, which started doing business in 1391 and is the third oldest pharmacy in Europe. Dubrovnik was also a filming location for *Game of Thrones*, and stores in Old Town carry many souvenirs from the television series.

SENSATIONAL SPLIT

Split is called the *Flower of the Mediterranean*, is Croatia's second largest city, is both modern and with ancient roots, and is a very busy port. It is a ferry and transportation hub to nearby islands, including Brac Island, Hvar and Trogir. It is also the



residence of the 2014 US Open Tennis Champion Marin Cilic and the birthplace of 2001 Wimbledon Champion Goran Ivaniševi, and several current University of Texas women players who told me in Austin that the most beautiful women and very tall people live in Split. According to *Lonely Planet*, Andy Roddick once commented "I don't know what's in the water in Croatia, but it seems like every player is over seven feet tall." It does seem that way. Croatian Ivo Karlovi is the tallest player ever on the ATP Tour at 6'11". A tennis player myself, I hope to return to Croatia in the future for the Konzum Croatia Open Umag, an ATP World Tour tennis tournament, which takes place every July.

Split's main claim to fame is Diocletian's Palace. It is a military fortress, an imperial residence and a fortified town that covers nearly eight acres and was built with white stone from Brac Island, marble from Italy and Greece, and columns and sphinxes from Egypt. It is considered to be the world's most complete remains of a Roman Palace. However, it is not a palace in the conventional sense - it has narrow maze-like streets, passageways and courtyards lined with souvenir and jewelry shops, restaurants and bars, markets, tourists, and approximately 3000 residents who live in the apartments within the palace walls. Our guide told us that the apartments are popular with renters, particularly with fans of *Game of Thrones*, since many scenes were filmed there. We were astonished to see laundry drying on lines from windows and children playing soccer in the streets. Immediately outside the palace is the statue of Gregorius of Nin. It's said that rubbing the statue's big left toe will bring good luck and guarantee a return visit to Split, so of course we took part in the tradition.

TRANSCENDENT TROGIR

We took a bus to nearby Trogir, situated on a small island connected to the mainland by a bridge. Trogir's culture was created under the influence of the ancient Greeks, then the Romans, followed by the Venetians who influenced the Renaissance and Baroque architecture within the city's medieval walls and for which it was named a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Trogir's colorful history includes rule by the Hapsburgs, Slovenes, Croats, Serbs and occupation by Napoleon Bonaparte. During World War II, it was conquered by Italy. Tito occupied it in 1944. Later it became part of Yugoslavia, and beginning in 1991, became part of Croatia.

We visited the Church of St. Lovro (also known as St. Lawrence), whose main west portal is a masterpiece by Radovan and considered to be the most significant work of the Romanesque-Gothic style in Croatia. Neither time nor weather permitted us to visit Zlatni Rat beach in Bol, which is one of the most popular beaches in all of Croatia. Beaches in Croatia, incidentally, are typically rocky or pebbly, not sandy, and many are FKK (German for *freikorperkultur*, meaning free body culture or clothing-optional).

RADIANT ROVINJ

Rovinj was our final stop and perhaps, my favorite, in Croatia. Hove Rovinj! It is located in the Northwest corner of the Istrian Peninsula. We walked up and around steep streets and piazzas, admiring the most fantastic views of the Adriatic and sailboats en route to any of the fourteen green islands of the Rovinj archipelago. We visited the Church of St. Euphemia, the largest Baroque building in Istria. Euphemia is Rovinj's patron saint. She was tortured for her Christian faith by Emperor Diocletian, and her marble tomb is found behind the church altar. The belfiy is modeled after St. Mark's in Venice, and a copper statue of St. Euphemia tops the bell tower and shows the direction of the wind by turning on a spindle. We strolled through the Old Town, sipped on coffee – a Croatian pastime, enjoyed a lunch of fresh fish and Italian gelato and were reenergized for more walking We discovered Grisia, a street lined with galleries and shops featuring Croatian lace, lavender, olive oil, white truffles, jewelry and fashion.

We saw local artists at work and with their work on display. We stopped at several galleries, and I found a painting by Croatian artist Walter Dadich I had to have. The gallery only accepted Kuna, and since we were nearing the end of our Croatian adventure, we didn't have enough of the local currency. We went to one of the banks that required us to change dollars to Euros to Kuna, a loss for us no matter how we calculated, but I did get my painting. It depicts Rovinj harbor and features the iconic Church of St. Euphemia. I am so glad to have it!

Croatia, a true jewel of the Mediterranean, is a must-see destination for all globetrotters. The sparkling clear blue and green water, the gorgeous coastline, the mountains, lakes and forests, the mixture of ancient and new contribute to Croatia's allure. The Greeks, Romans and Venetians went there for rest and relaxation. Emperor Diocletian went there to retire. Agatha Christie spent her second honeymoon there. Alfred Hitchcock said the most beautiful sunsets anywhere in the world are there. Whether you travel to experience international style, delectable dining, captivating culture or outdoor sports, Croatia has it all. Whether you sail up the coast by boat, or travel overland, Croatia's stunning sapphire coast and rich cultural history will make an unforgettable impression.

SWEPT AWAY TO MEXICO

here are all-inclusive resorts and there are all-inclusive resorts. Iberostar Grand Hotel Paraiso is unabashedly the latter. The former connotes images of all-you-can-eat buffets, several blue lagoons-meet-playground-style pools, cabanas on the beach, and a daunting itinerary of hourly activities, performances and programming. Iberostar Grand Hotel Paraiso does offer all of the aforementioned activities; this Mexican auberge's distinction, however, lies within its subtle charm.

Upon arrival at the Riviera Maya compound's pearly gates, yes, complimentary transport from the Cancun International Airport is available, travelers whiz past Grupo Iberstar's additional four on-property hotels, each representing a unique accommodation level. Iberostar Paraiso Maya, Paraiso Lindo, Paraiso Beach, and Paraiso Del Mar all cater toward the luxury-loving clientele.

The Grand Hotel Paraiso sits in a class, perched on a hill of its own. At first glance, the resort is all at once intimidating and magnetizing. There's both a warm reception from the bellhops who confidently whisk away luggage and a hushed greeting from check-in staff who receive new guests at the lobby bar, a rather refreshing departure from whipping out one's credit card in line airport-style, thank you. Admittedly, the Le Cirque-esque watering hole isn't particularly lavish nor modern, but what the parlor lacks in flash, the receding atrium hall compensates for in spades.

Just beyond the foyer's stately columns lies a domed garden oasis with decidedly transformative powers, especially after a welcome cocktail or two. Its gilded ceiling, majestically painted ala Sistine Chapel, enchants so convincingly, one partially expects a mythical creature or, at the very least, an opera singer, to appear from thin air. On second thought, make that dense, humid air. Thankfully, in my case, a porter broke the neo-Renaissance spell for the first true adventure: locating my suite. There are two methods of travel across Grand Hotel Paraiso's expansive TK acres: golf cart or on foot. My advice? Opt for the wheels.


Past serene, interior facing balconies, the spa's palatial twostory dwelling complete with a tiled saltwater pool, several glass-enclosed restaurants, and the colossal, ocean-facing pool of Poseidon's dreams – more on those later - are dueling beachfront towers. Each one boasts three floors of plush, butler-attended rooms with spectacular views.

HOW ACCOMMODATING

Here, accommodations feel more like the home of a dear friend or relative's decadent, yet lived-in, pied-a-terre. The staff, décor, and personal touches are warm and inviting, a difficult quality to mimic when servicing some 310 chambers including ten private villas. And yet, Grand Hotel Paraiso delivers with aplomb.

According to one guest who's visited the resort some 30 times in his 30 years, the property's allure is the ability to reinvent itself without sacrificing hospitality. The little details, handwritten notes from housekeeping staff, chilled champagne and daily fresh fruit, seamlessly restocked minibars, and nightly chocolates, *read home away from home*, only chicer.

Take the resort's mammoth-sized main pool, for example. All of the conventional trappings are there: swim-up pool bar, partially submerged lounge chairs, cabana vignettes of every size and configuration. But the barkeep are dressed to the nine's, books and magazines are available via a poolside library, the music is subdued and remarkably tasteful, and fellow guests gussy up a tad swankier than one would expect.







The same rings true of the Grand Hotel Paraiso's seven dining options. Each of the property's sweeping Greco-meets-baroque restaurants, Venecia, Toni's, L'Atelier, Haiku, and Bella Vista, serve Italian, surf & turf, French gourmet, Japanese, and steak a la carte, respectively. Attire for each is resort chic; no collarless shirts or maillots, however posh, allowed. In the mood for Mexican? (When in Rome...) Try Las Brisas for "show cooking" and sprawling buffet options amidst white tablecloth service overlooking the clubhouse's mod al fresco bottle-service setup in the sand. A glass of Rose', anyone?

TRY ADVENTURE OR REFRESH


For the adventurous types, Cancun Adventures' luxury sailing and snorkeling tour comes highly recommended. The concierge can happily arrange a day out in the Caribbean for diving, reef exploring, or sun bathing on a catamarans pristine deck. Open bar and a seasonal bento boxed lunch are included, of course.

If rest, relaxation, and rejuvenation are itinerary must-haves, Grand Hotel Paraiso's indulgent Spa Sensations does not disappoint. The couplesoriented haven features both Turkish and Roman baths, full salon services, and an impressive menu of pampering options. I elected for a caviar massage though rumor has it that the chocolate scrub is equally divine.

Relishing one's suite is also unexpectedly gratifying. From the soaking tub, rain-head showers, and well-appointed bath products to the cocoon-style porch swings that dot each terrace, staying can be a splendid experience, too.

Although Iberostar's Grand Hotel Paraiso may have not reinvented the all-inclusive wheel, it's certainly perfected the art form of a chic Mexico stay. Leave the kids at home, pack and extra Pucci caftan or two, and prepare to fall in love with Riviera Maya's most unexpectedly charismatic destination.










THE VIBE:


