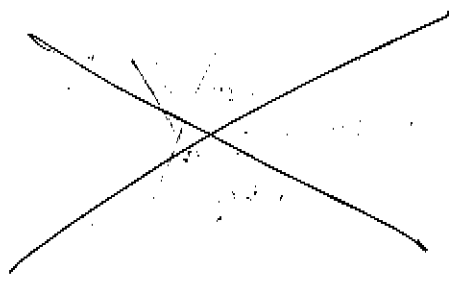

Denton civic center dedication to honor architect O'Neil Ford

DENTON — The works of architect and native son O'Neil Ford will be honored this weekend with a dedication ceremony, tour and exhibit.

Saturday, the city will officially announce the O'Neil Ford Civic Complex, which consists of the Denton Municipal Building, the Municipal Swimming Pool, the Emily Fowler Public Library and the Denton Civic Center.

A historic marker will be unveiled at the dedication ceremony, which begins at 10 a.m. in the Civic Center courtyard, 215 E. McKinney St.

At 11 a.m., the University of North Texas's Bill Mercer will moderate a symposium, "O'Neil Ford and His Gift to Denton." Among the speakers are architects Roland Laney, Carolyn Peterson, Frank Welch, and Dwayne and Jane Lan-

dry.

Toni La Selle, who worked with Mr. Ford building his most famous work, the Little Chapel-in-the-Woods at Texas Woman's University, will also speak.

A self-guided driving tour of 15 of Mr. Ford's designs begins at 1 p.m. The structures visited include the TWU chapel, which was dedicated by Eleanor Roosevelt in 1939, and the first residence Mr. Ford built.

Sunday, an exhibit titled "O'Neil Ford: A Denton Legacy," opens to the public at the Center for Visual Arts, 400 E. Hickory St. It includes architectural plans, carvings and photographs. The exhibit will run until Aug. 13 and is closed on Saturdays.

Denton Honors Architect O'Neil Ford

The City of Denton, in conjunction with the center for Texas Studies at the University of North Texas and the Historical Society of Denton County, is hosting a two-day celebration of the architectural works of O'Neil Ford.

O'Neil Ford is arguably the most prominent architect to have come from Texas. In his long and distinguished career, he achieved both popular and critical success. Still, he retained a strong commitment to his hometown of Denton, where he says his fascination with architecture began with the Denton County Courthouse.

As a tribute to O'Neil Ford, the Center for Visual Arts at 400 E. Hickory will host a private reception to view an exhibit of the architect's work. The exhibit, "O'Neil Ford: A Denton Legacy," will include architectural plans, carvings and photographs. It will be open to the public from August 1-13, excluding Saturday's.

On July 31, the city of Denton will honor O'Neil Ford by officially dedicating the buildings he designed in Civic Center Park as the O'Neil Ford Civic Complex. The buildings in the complex include the Denton Municipal Building, the Municipal Swimming Pool, the Emily Fowler Public Library and the Denton Civic Center.

The dedication ceremony begins at 10 a.m. in the City Hall courtyard at 215 E. McKinney, and the public is invited to attend. A historical marker honoring Ford will be revealed at this time. At 11 a.m., a symposium entitled "O'Neil Ford and His Gift to Denton" will be moderated by Bill Mercer. Speakers include Ford's former associates Roland Laney, Carolyn Peterson, Frank Welch and Dwayne and Jane Landry.

A self-guided driving tour of 15 of the structures designed by Ford begins at 1 p.m. Included in the tour is the first residence he built in 1929 and his renowned Little Chapel-in-the-Woods, built on the campus of Texas Woman's University.

The Little Chapel project brought national attention to the architect's works. Eleanor Roosevelt spoke at the dedication of the Little Chapel in 1939. In 1983, the Texas Society of Architects voted the Little Chapel one of the 20 most architecturally significant buildings in Texas. It is recorded in the national Register of Historic Places and is a Texas Historical Landmark.

Among his other best known works are Trinity University in San Antonio, Skidmore College in New York, the Tower of the Americas in San Antonio, the Bell Tower at the University of Dallas and Texas Instruments buildings in Dallas, Italy, France and England.

The O'Neil Ford Civic Complex Dedication Task Force met on Tuesday, May 11th at the Denton Senior Center to discuss plans for the dedication ceremony. Those present included Mayor Bob Castleberry, Frank Robbins, Mike Cochran, Ray Gough, Alan Gibby, Janet Simpson, Cecile Carson and Lorraine McGregor.

Ray Gough reported that the Denton Record-Chronicle will help with the exhibit at the Visual Arts Center by enlarging the photographs. In addition, some three dimensional objects would be displayed. He stated that his concern was the \$700.00 cost of mounting the 35 photographs on the wall. This will include the cost to purchase the matte and plexiglass and to tack the photographs to the wall. Sara, from the Visual Arts Center has indicated that some plexiglass may be available at the Center, and will be in contact with Mike Cochran.

Several other possible O'Neil Ford objects were mentioned that could be used in the exhibit including light fixtures from Mayor Castleberry, the Selwyn School and the Civic Center, a wood carving and weaving from the Library, and a project sign from Mike Cochran. Lorraine McGregor suggested that a news release be prepared requesting that owners of any known artifacts contact the Committee.

Mayor Castleberry suggested that in addition to the dedication marker, a lighted sign be placed at the corner of McKinney and Bell. Plaques for the individual buildings were also discussed. Mike Cochran will write a letter to the City Council requesting the signage. The Committee also indicated that the location, for the dedication marker should be at the City Hall Courtyard.

The O'Neil Civic Complex Dedication Task Force met on Tuesday, April 13 at the Emily Fowler Library to discuss plans for the dedication ceremony.

Liz Bays reported that the SPAN trolley would not be available for the group tours to various O'Neil Ford designed buildings. After discussion by the Task Force, the most viable option was to provide a map for self-guided tours. Neta Stallings suggested that the Selwyn School and TWU (Little Chapel in the Woods) be contacted and asked to conduct tours at specific times on the day of the ceremony.

Various locations for the plaque or monument were discussed including the Civic Center Garden or the courtyard at City Hall. Roland Laney felt that the courtyard was a more suitable site and that the plaque could be designed as a relief of the O'Neill Ford Civic Complex.

Jane Biles informed the Task Force that the date of the ceremony needed to be changed to allow the City Council to attend. The new date was set for July 31st. Mike Cochran will confirm this change with David Dillion (Dallas Morning News Architecture Critic) who has agreed to speak at the ceremony.

Mike Cochran outlined a tentative schedule of events as follows:

Roland Laney will contact Frank Welch and Dewayne Landry through the AIA and ask them to serve on the panel.

Ray Gough asked what funds were available for the exhibit at the Visual Arts Center. Jane Biles asked that he submit a preliminary budget, and that the Task Force would work from there to secure the funding. In addition to the exhibit, funds will be required for the plaque (estimated at \$700), the reception, and invitation printing and postage.


Several agencies outside the City were suggested for funding including the Greater Denton Arts Center, which has agreed to co-sponsor the event, the Center for Texas Studies, and the Denton County Historical Society.

Roland Laney asked that Stanley Marcus be invited to the reception and ceremony.

The date for the next meeting of the Task Force was set for Tuesday, May 11 at 4:00 p.m. The Library room is not available on this date. Prior to May 11 you will receive a reminder identifying the location. Please mark your calendars now and plan to attend.

OVERVIEW

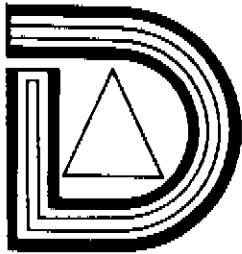

Chill out: program shows how to make hot profit in Siberia

"Small Business — Big Risk? How to Profit in Siberia."

Selling snow shovels? Huskies? Windshield ice scrapers? Electric refrigerators without motors?

You can get the word from a Tomsk Region delegation from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Tuesday at the World Trade Center, Suite 150. The cost is \$20 in advance or \$25 at the door, and that includes breakfast and a Russian lunch.

Caviar, blinis, borscht, vodka? Call 747-1300 for reservations and ask.

Not so fast. Where's Tomsk?

The oil-rich region is in Siberia. But the city of Tomsk is at 56 degrees and 30 minutes north and 84 degrees and 58 minutes east — right there on the map!

It's a little farther north of and about 1,800 miles — give or take a troika ride — east of Moscow on the Trans-Siberian Railroad.

The region is on the main line. The city is on a short spur north of the main line.

Until now, we're told by Bavarian (which referred to Southern Germany the last we heard) International Associates, the region was formerly a "closed" city because of industrial, scientific and military installations.

The delegation will include Stephan Sulakshin, President Boris Yeltsin's representative; Vladimir L. Ponomarenko, first deputy head of the Administration of Tomsk Region; Dr. Yuri Pokholkov, rector of Tomsk Polytechnical University; and Dr. Vladimir Jampolsky, vice president of TPU and director of the Cybernetic Center.

In addition to the guest speakers, the program will include a lecture by Moscow-based Gregory Raiter on "How to Limit Your Risk and Enhance Your Profit When Doing Business in Russia."

There'll also be a panel discussion by local businessmen currently doing business in the Commonwealth of Independent States (formerly the Soviet Union).

Sponsors include the U.S. and Foreign Commercial Service of the U.S. Department of Commerce, International Business Center of the Dallas County Community College District, International Trade Association of Dallas-Fort Worth Area, Russian-American Chamber of Commerce and North Texas District Export Council.
