TUBING UPDATE

In the last newsletter I told about putting a 1/2" of brass tubing in the bottom of the plastic Kodak Cirkut film spools to take out the sloppy fit in the camera. Myron Wright gave me specific data about this tubing that I failed to do. The brass tubing is 7/32" outside diameter, 3/16" inside diameter with a 1/64" wall thickness. The tubing is generally available at well stocked hobby shops.

INTERVIEW WITH KORNELIUS SCHORLE

I called Mr. Schorle of The Photo Connection in California about the new Electopan Camera that his company is having manufactured and is now available in limited quantities. The camera has a rotating Pentax 50mm f2 lens which is critically focused at 11 feet. Depth of field at f22 is 2.5 feet to infinity. The horizontal angle is 129 degrees, picture size 2 x 4 3/4 inches with 6 exposures to a roll of 120 film. Rotation speeds are - 125, 60, 30, 15, 1/8. You can use the 1/8 speed to build exposure density to whatever as it makes an exposure in both rotation directions. This can be done manually and by an electronic cable release. The camera is powered by 8 AA batteries, 4 to power the shutter and 4 to rotate and return the lens, film advance is manual. Viewfinder is optical and the camera weight is 4 pounds. Price \$2200. Future models will be developed to take 220 film as well as 35mm.

I asked if this camera is taking the place of the long awaited return of the Panon 120? He replied that the Panon 120 will be quite awhile making a return as the Japan factory burned down. This new camera was designed and developed with features far advanced over the Panon 120.

I was also informed that his company is making modifications to the Widelix camera such as changing the shutter speed to 1 speed only - 1/1500 of a second. Another modification is a variable speed camera from 1 second to 1/200. They have other modifications planned for this camera so if you own a Widelix and would like it to perform other than a factory model contact the Photo Connection people and they will tell you what can be done with this camera to satisfy your needs.

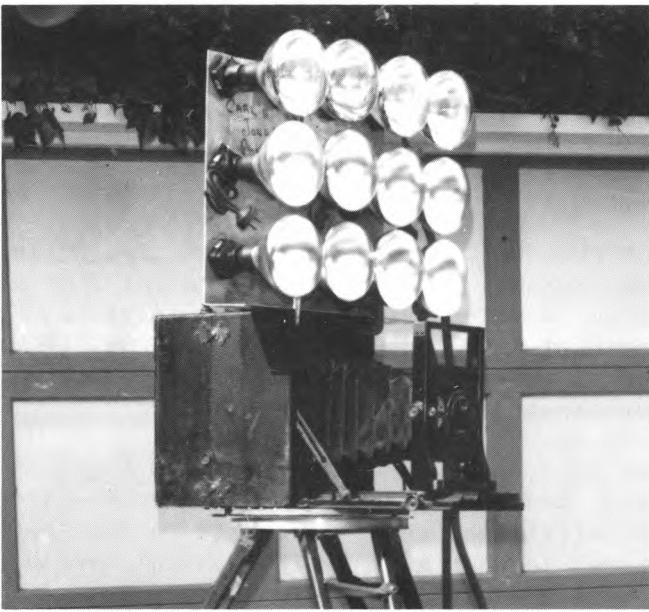

COLOR SEPERATIONS OF CIRKUT PRINTS

I have had several customers who I have discussed assignments to be done with my number 10 of projects that the end. color photograph had to be printed to a specific size (either smaller or larger) or printed on Duratran material to specific sizes. You have to do some extensive leg work to find out from your local printers and color seperation houses what their maximum input scanner or camera copy board sizes are vs the size needed to be printed. You must also talk with your local labs to find out what their capabilities and maximum sizes are for murals and Duratrans and if they can or will use a Cirkut negative in sections for the production. You have to do some careful plotting and scaling of the image size to fit the required need of your customer and also satisfy the labs and separators requirements for a successful conclusion. To use a number 10 negative in todays market takes a bit of doing to satisfy many production people. You may need two or three identical negatives or several identical prints that can be cut in order to reproduce the images to meet specific size requirements. You may have to use the widest angle lens you have on your number 10 to condense the image as short as possible. Or you may find the number 10 not to be the practical camera to use at all but to use a smaller format panoramic camera whos image and film size would fit the labs and separators requirements better. Or you may find that a standard 4x5 or 8x10 view camera with a good quality wide angle lens will do the job very well. The last word is you have to do your homework and know exactly what you are doing in this panoramic business. RGF



This 12 light setup on top of a number 10 Cirkut Camera is the invention of Carl H. Jones of Louisville, Kentucky. He is a Cirkut photographer who for many years traveled to all the national Babbit Conventions that were held in all the major convention halls in the USA. He has been retired for several years now but still reflects upon those years of doing his cirkut photos.

At the beginning of each conference he was given 5 minutes to make his 1 cirkut exposure of the entire conference audience. He used Vericrome Pan film exposed between f5.6 and f8 with fill lighting from his 12 bulbs that put out some 8200 watts of light. The top bulbs were 4-750 watt spots aimed at the upper part of the hall. The other 8 bulbs were RSP2 floods. He built a special #8 220 volt cable with claw connectors to connect to the auditorium main electric service. At the camera the 220 volt line had a junction box which divided the power to two 110 volt #12 lines to power the 12 bulbs. A couple of C-clamps held the light panel to the top of the #10 camera. He said the weight of the light panel, bulbs and wire did not interfere with the operation of the camera or the quality of the result.

After the picture was made he then immediately processed the B&W film in D-76, dipped the wet negative in rubbing alcohol and squeegeed both sides of the film, held it over a hot plate to fast dry it. He said if was in Florida he would go outside and dry it in the sun.

If the density of the negative wasn't exactly what he liked he would use Victor Intensifier overall or in specific areas where it was needed to build density. Potassium Ferricyanide was another chemical he carried with him for overall or specific area density reductions.

He also carried a lettering set which he used to title each of his cirkut negatives. He then began making cirkut prints on his special made portable contact printer through the night for selling the next day. He said he has made as many as 500 prints overnight for next day sales. The wet prints were hung to dry on clothes lines.

Being that he is now in his 70's and semi-retired, he wouldn't want to attempt such projects anymore.

A BOOK ON CIRKUT PHOTOGRAPHY?

Myron Wright asked that question. Is there any interest in such a project? I have never written a book so I don't know what the procedures would be to document today's use of the Cirkut camera and other panoramic cameras. Be interesting to see a chapter or two on the history of the cirkut and other panoramic cameras and how they are being used with today's films and assignments. Cost vs sales would make it quite expensive no doubt.

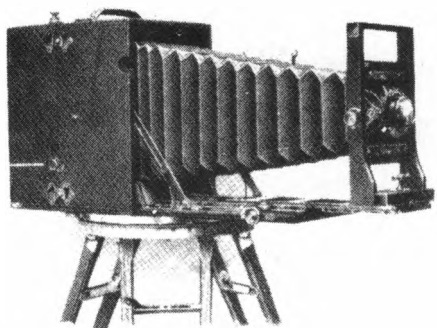
