Chapter I

INTRODUCTION

<u>NATURE AND LIMITATIONS OF THE STUDY</u>: This study deals with an investigation of men's intercollegiate athletics in North Texas State Teachers College during the eleven year period 1924--25 through 1934--35. More especially it is a study into the growth, program, and the the individual athletes who have earned letters in the following intercollegiate sports: (1) football, (2) basket ball, and (3) track.

SOURCE OF INFORMATION: This study was gathered by sending out questionnaires to one hundred and eighty-eight athletes, by interviewing some of the faculty members, by using records in the Placement Office and in the Registrar's Office of North Texas State Teachers College, and by running the files of the Campus Chat, a college weekly publication, the Yucca, the college year book, and the minutes of the Meetings of the Athletic Council. A total of one hundred and sixtyfour questionnaires were sent and only eighteen athletes failed to return them after a third request. However, fourteen athletes could not be located and five athletes have died since earning their letters. With the help of Mr. E. H. Farrington and other friends and relatives of the group, some of the information desired has been obtained. A sample of the questionnaire can be found in the appendix.

A check on this questionnaire was made by checking the

athletes's permanent record in the Registrar's Office and his location card in the Placement Office. This check was made by using a chart to list the names, grades, major and minor subjects, high school attended, occupation of parent or guardian, and the degree or degrees held, if any, by the athletes. A copy of the check sheet may be found in the appendix.

A further check was made on the letters that have been earned by the various athletes and the records of the track men by use of the minutes of the Meetings of the Athletic Council. Information in regard to the athletic plant was secured from Mr. T. J. Fouts and Dr. S. A. Blackburn, who have been members of the college faculty during this period.

TREATMENT OF DATA: The Physical Plant was discussed in the second chapter with the development of the plant, and the various improvements that have been made. The major sports at the college which have been studied were considered from the standpoint of opponents, wins, losses, records, improvements, and personnel of the teams. The status of the athletes was considered from the standpoint of athletics, scholastic attainments, and social activities while in college as well as while out of college. Then the athletes were considered from the standpoint of position, salary, and location since leaving college.

Chapter II

THE PHYSICAL EDUCATION PLANT

The athletic park of North Texas State Teachers College is located just south of the main campus. This park covers a twelve-acre plot of ground. It provides not only for athletic and physical education benefits but also for recreational activities for students, teachers, and townspeople. Recreational facilities within the park provide for swimming, golf, volley ball, basket ball, football, tennis, ping pong, soft ball, archery, horseshoe pitching, croquet, track, movies, and dancing.




Fig. 1. Floor Plan of Men's Gymnasium Scale--1 inch equals 20 feet

The men's gymnasium is a made-over building from the first demonstration school of the college.¹ It served as a barracks during the World War. After the war, it was made into a gymnasium which with a few changes is our present men's gymnasium. This wooden structure was built through efforts of Dr. S. A. Blackburn and employees at a very small cost.² This building is no longer used for varsity athletics, but intra-mural athletics for men and physical education classes for men are scheduled in this gymnasium, which was erected at a cost of \$5000.³ Figure 1 shows a complete fboor plan of the men's gymnasium.

The Harriss Gymnasium was also built as a result of the efforts of Dr. Blackburn. When the late president, Dr. R. L. Marquis. first assumed his duties as president of the college, the state legislature had appropriated \$300,000 for a new administration building and \$10,000 for temporary buildings which must contain ten class rooms. Dr. Blackburn rushed into Dr. Marquis' office and asked him about building a girls' gymnasium with the lumber from the old administration building and the \$10,000 that was to be used for construction of the temporary buildings. Blackburn was given until five o'clock that afternoon to submit his plans to the president. These plans were then rushed to the state architect and approved. As a result of this man's initiative, North Texas State Teachers College obtained a building valued at \$25,000 at a cost of \$10.000.⁴ This gymnasium is used for the girl's intra-mural athletic program, for physical education classes, and for varsity basket ball.

Football enthusiasts are adequately supplied with facilities for the sport. In 1920, when T. J. Fouts, the present athletic director, came to the college; the gridiron was ten yards short and was covered with grass burrs, it was enclosed by an eightfoot board fence, and the spectators were seated in a small grandstand which was in one corner.⁵ During Fouts' directorship at the college, there has been a marked improvement.

At the present time, there is a well-sodded, turtlebacked football field, which is well-lighted for night games. This field, which is used mostly for games, is a regulation field in all respects. The lights are mounted on ten steel towers, five towers on each side of the playing field. These towers give off the light of four reflectors with five hundred watt light bulbs. Current to these various towers is supplied by an underground current system. A master switch controls the entire lighting system, but there are also individual switches for each tower.⁶ A \$10,000 steel-constructed grandstand has been erected for the comfort of the spectators. The grandstand is three hundred feet long; the highest seat is thirty feet from track level, and the lowest is seven feet from the track level. This structure, which was completed in 1927, was built to seat twenty-four hundred people, but three thousand can be crowded into it. 7 Underneath the stand is a brick field house built in 1933. This building and the new college hospital were built at the same time with an expenditure of only \$25,000. The field house is fifteen feet wide and is the same length as the grandstand; it is used by all athletes participating in foot ball and track. Figure 2 shows a complete floor plan of the field house

with uses of each room. West of the playing field and just back of the grandstand is another football field which is known as the practice field. Football practice is held on this conveniently located field. The doors to the field house open on to it. A ramp underneath the grandstand connects the two football fields.

The present track was built with T. J. Fouts in charge, and most of the work was done by student labor. For constructing the track a foreman and machinery were borrowed from a local contractor who was a friend of the college. With \$10,000 to do the job, it was started in the summer of 1930 and was completed in January, 1931 at a construction cost of only \$6,000.9 On the west side of the football field, the one-hundred-yard straightaway is thirty feet wide as is the two-hundred-and-twenty-yard straightaway which is directly across the football field from the grandstand. On both the north and south end of the track after taking the curve, the track is only twenty-five feet wide. The complete oval measuring one foot from the curb is onefourth mile. Between the one-hundred-yard straightaway and the football field are pits which are used for jumping and vaulting.

For those who are interested in tennis, there are thirteen courts. Four of these are concrete, and nine are clay. The two concrete courts west of the men's gymnasium were

built in the summer of 1932 at a cost of \$2200. The lines on these courts are inlaid with white cement. The concrete slab which is used for skating and dancing as well as for tennis was built in the spring of 1931 at a cost of \$2200.¹⁰ The first clay courts were built in 1927. Prior to this time, dirt or gravel courts were used.¹¹ The clay courts are constructed on the natural rock foundation with a mixture of fire clay and chat. Three parts of chat to one part of fire clay was the formula used in this construction. The clay courts were constructed at a cost of \$500 per court.¹²

The golf enthusiast is also adequately supplied with facilities for his chosen sport. In the spring of 1930, a miniature golf course was constructed at a cost of \$1500. A fee of ten cents per game was charged for a period of two years until the golf course was paid for. West of the swimming pool is a nine-hole putting green, and back of the grandstand there is a four-hole golf course. The putting green and the four-hole golf course were constructed in 1935 with National Youth Administration labor at a cost of \$200.¹³ The four-hole course, where golfers practice their iron shots, has winter and bermuda grass greens. These greens are one hundred and forty-

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eight yards, seventy-eight yards, one hundred yards, and eighty-three yards apart as the course is to be played; and par is thirteen.

East of the track and football field is the swimming pool which was constructed in 1926 at a cost of \$26,000. Just east of the swimming pool is an outdoor theater. The projection room is located above the dressing rooms for the swimming pool. This outdoor theater was first built for silent pictures at a cost of \$1,500, but it was later remodeled and a vitaphone was put in at an additional cost of \$1,000.¹⁴ Two barbecue pits were constructed by National Youth Administration labor at a cost of \$25.¹⁵ These pits are used by scouts, student campers, faculty members, student picnickers, and ex-students for outdoor luncheons.

The entire park is fenced by interwoven wire with six strands of barbed wire above this. This serves to keep out undesireable persons or animals. The fencing around the park was put up at a cost of \$1,500. Around the tennis courts west of the men's gymnasium, a steel fence was erected in 1930 at a cost of \$4.000.¹⁶

Chapter III

ATHLETICS IN NORTH TEXAS STATE TEACHERS COLLEGE FROM 1924--25 THROUGH 1934--35

From the Personal Record Sheets of the faculty members of North Texas State Teachers College kept in the President's office the following data concerning coaches have been secured.

During the period of eleven years beginning with the football season of 1924 and ending with the track season of 1935, athletic destinies of North Texas State Teachers College have been in the hands of the following men: Theron J. Fouts, John Bond Reid, Charles C. Sportsman, Jack Sisco, and Terrence Myracle. Fouts, who is at the present time director of athletics, head of the Physical Education Department, and Dean of Men, came to the college in 1920 as football and track coach.

John Bond Reid came to the college in 1924 as basket ball and baseball coach and later became head football coach. Reid remained with the college through the summer term in 1929, when he left to become basket ball coach at Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College.

Fouts became athletic director and Charles C. Sportsman, former North Texas State Teachers College letterman and graduate, was selected in 1928 as track coach and assistant football coach.

Sportsman is still with the college in the capacity of freshman football coach and varsity track coach.

Terrence Myracle, another letterman and graduate of the

college, first became a member of the college faculty as an instructor in physical education in January, 1928. Myracle was away for two terms and returned to the faculty for the spring term in 1929. Upon Reid's leaving for Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College, Myracle became head basket ball coach and assistant football coach in which capacity he served through the summer term of 1933.

Jack Sisco came to North Texas State Teachers College from Baylor University, where he received his B. B. A. degree and was serving as freshman football coach, in the spring term of 1929. Sisco's first duties were those of an assistant coach but with Reid's departure he became head coach. Sisco has been with the college since that time and in the same capacity until the term of 1934--35, when the duties of head basket ball coach were added to his. However, "Pete Shands was added to the staff as head basket ball coach and assistant football coach in September, 1935."¹

Since 1921, athletics at the college have been governed by a committee for that purpose. This committee is known as the Athletic Council and is composed of five faculty members and four student members, one of whom is selected from each class in the undergraduate school. "All intercollegiate athletic affairs such as awards, schedules, et cetera must pass the approval of this committee."² With this set up, college

athletics are controlled from within the college and not by the alumni association. From the football season of 1924 through the football season of 1934, the North Texas State Teachers College has played one hundred and four football games. They have won fifty-five, lost forty, and tied nine games. Their schedules have included Southwestern Conference representatives from Southern Methodist University, Texas Christian University, Baylor University, and Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College. Other teams played, except Decatur Junior College, were of the Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association which divided into the Lone Star Conference and the Texas Conference in 1932.³ Season's results and standings as found in 1925 through 1935 Yuccas show that during this period the North Texas State Teachers College teams have scored 1,108 points to their opponents 1,090. Table I shows the opponents, number of games played, games won, games lost, and total scores for opponents as well as for North Texas State Teachers College.

Under the coaching of Jack Sisco, the North Texas State Teachers College won its first Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association championship in football in 1931 by defeating Daniel Baker in the final game by a score of 32--13.⁴ The next year the old Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association divided into the Texas and Lone Star Conferences with North Texas State Teachers College joining the Lone Star Conference

along with East Texas State Teachers College, Stephen F. Austin State Teachers College, Sam Houston State Teachers College, South Western Texas State Teachers College, and Trinity University.⁵ North Texas State Teachers College won the first championship in the new Lone Star Conference but yielded this honor to East Texas State Teachers College in 1933 and in 1934.⁶

The North Texas State Teachers College basket ball team won the Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association in 1926 by winning twelve out of fourteen games.⁷ North Texas State Teachers College was never able to win the championship in basket ball during the remainder of the existence of the old Texas Intercollegiate Association, nor has it been able to emerge from a cage season in the Lone Star Conference with a championship.⁸ Table II gives data as to teams played, and as to number of games played, won, and lost.

While they were in the Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association, the North Texas State Teachers College track teams could do no better than a second place in the conference track meets. Abilene Christian College proved to be too powerful for the Teachers College athletes. However, North Texas State Teachers College has proved their superiority in the Lone Star Conference by winning the championship in

1933 and 1935 and by placing second in 1934.9 North Texas State Teachers College track teams always enter the Forth Worth Fat Stock Show meet, and they enter special events at the Texas Relays. They entered the Southern Methodist University Relays before these were discontinued. 10 In 1933. Coach Charles C. Sportsman and five track men went to the Louisiana Relays and returned after annexing third place In winning third place, J. D. Moore led the North honors. Texas State Teachers College in ppoints by winning first in the one-hundred-and-twenty-yard high hurdles, third in the shot put, and third in the discus. The North Texas State Teachers College Relay Team won first place in the eight-hundred-and-eighty-yard relay and second in the one-mile relay.11 The next track season the North Texas State Teachers College entered a team in the Medley Relay at the Kansas Relays and won second place.¹² The 1935 track team was represented at the Drake Relay by a two-mile-relay team. This team won second place in its event.¹³ Tables III and IV show complete data regarding dual and truangular meets respectively.

Football and track are on the up grade, but basdeveloped. ket ball has not held its own since 1926 and 1927. However, a renewed interest is expected with Pete Shands at the helm of basket ball destinies. North Texas State Teachers College track teams are bringing in more publicity for the college with the exceptional showing in the Lone Star conference, in dual meets with Southwestern Conference Teams, and in the better relay carnivals throughout the country than are teams of the other two sports. Football has showed a steady increase. North Texas State Teachers College gridiron warriors are always in the thick of the fight for the conference championship and do exceptionally well against South western Con-The feature game that has been played outside ference elevens. of the conference is the defeat of the Southern Methodist University Mustangs in 1933 by a score of 7--0.

According to the minutes of the Athletic Council meetings there have been one hundred and ninety letters awarded in football to ninety-six athletes, ninety-five basket ball letters have been awarded to forty-nine athletes, and one hundred and fifty-two track letters have been awarded to eighty-three athletes during the eleven year period from 1924--25 through 1934--35. For information as to athletes who earned the various letters, see Table V. which gives the athletes and number of letters earned in each of the sports.

Since only the sports of football, basket ball, and track, are being discussed, a three-sport man is considered as one who has earned letters in all three of those sports. There have been only five men who have earned letters in the three sports mentioned during this period. Four of these five men have graduated from the college. The fifth man left college after completing his intercollegiate athletics and started playing professional football.¹⁴ Table VI gives the three-sport men and number of years letters were earned in each sport. In addition to these five three-sport men there have been seven athletes to earn letters in football and basket ball; nineteen athletes have earned letters in both football and track; and four athletes have earned letters in basket ball and track. These are considered as two-sport men and Table VII gives the two-sport men and number of years each earned letters in the respective sports.

STATUS OF LETTERMEN

Grades for the entire group of lettermen were secured from the registrar's office of North Texas State Teachers College. The grades dealt with are those that hage been made in this college and not grades that have been transferred from other colleges. The total number of grades turned in to the registrar for athletes during this period is 9269 of which 796 or 8.59% are A's, 2691 or 29.03% are B's, 3754 or 40.39% are C's, 1408 or 15.17% are D's, and 620 or 6.69% are failures. See Table XIV which sets the grades up in a frequency table and shows the median grade of the athletes to be 79.6.

Out of one hundred and eighty-eight athletes studied one hundred and twenty have received their degrees from

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


Fig. 4. Percentage Grade Scale---l inch equals 10% either North Texas State Teachers College or some other reputable college, twenty-six are still enrolled in college and one is working toward additional credit and degrees, thirty-six have entered some field out of school without graduating from college, five have completed the work for their master's degree, and two have received their M. D. Degrees. Table XV gives the type of degree and number of athletes receiving the degree.

Data have been secured showing in Table XVI what one hundred and forty-seven of the one hundred and eighty-eight athletes study as the major subject while in college. Majors and Minors of Athletes

During the period from 1924-25 through 1934-35, thirty-five boys have been selected by their team mates to serve as captains of the various athletic teams. This is an honorary position and is usually filled by a leader on the team as well as an outstanding player. The best player is not usually selected, and boys are not selected by their team mates on the basis of their playing ability but on the basis of friendship and qualities of leadership. The system of awards at North Texas State Teachers College allows the captain of any intercollegiate sport to be given an extra bar award. Throughout this period, there have been only two athletes that have served as captains in more than one sport. Carl Miller served as captain of the football team in 1926 and as co-captain of the track team in 1927. Charles Cox served as captain of the 1934 football team and as captain of the 1935 basket ball team. Table XVII gives a complete list of the athletes. who have held this honorary position in each sport.

Individual attainment can be best measured in football and basket ball by the all-conference selections. North Texas State Teachers College, as has been mentioned before, has be-

longed to two conferences. The Lone Star Conference was formed in 1932, and prior to this time there were more teams than are in our present conference. Therefore, it can readily be understood why there have been more men selected on mythical or all-conference teams in recent years than when North Texas State Teachers College was in the old Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association. Table XVIII gives names of boys who have been selected on mythical teams, years of the selection, sport, and positions played. These athletes were picked on the all-conference teams by votes of opponents. coaches, and sports writers. Nov all-conference selection is made in track and field. However, an athlete is given more opportunities to show his supremacy in this sport than in football and basket ball. There is no desire to leave an impression that there is no team play in the sport of track and field, but it is true that football and basket ball depend entirely upon team play, and an athlete can more easily show individual supremacy in track and field events than in other sports. In a race, the man who comes in first is the winner, and in a jumping contest, the man who jumps the farthest is the winner; but in football and basket ball, it takes the entire team to score points even if the ballyhoo in the newspapers goes to the scores of the touchdown or the man who scores the most baskets. For that reason, we have record-holders among our athletes who compete in track. There are two types of records to be considered in the conference record

and the college record. In some instances, the college record is the conference record. Conference records are records that are established only in the conference track meets. College records are the records established by North Texas State Teachers College Athletes in any type of competition. Records are counted if the contestant places in field events and establishes a new record, but in running events a first place must be won in order for a new record to be established. Gold record medals, valued at \$12.50, are given by the college to any athlete who breaks a college record.¹ Table XIX lists the athletes and the number of college and conference records they have held.

In studying this group of one hundred and eighty-eight athletes, it is found that their interests vary very much in extra-curricular activities other than athletics. According to Table XXI these athletes belonged to twenty-two different types of clubs, councils, or organizations. These data collected from the questionnaires that were went out show only one hundred and seven members of the T. Club when there should be one hundred and eighty-eight since a man is automatically a member of the lettermen's club when he is awarded a letter. However, only one hundred and seven boys listed the T. Club in their club affiliations. Athletes who served as a class officer in any capacity are also listed in this group under the heading of class officers. Members of the various county clubs are also listed together under the heading of county clubs. In this table there has been another combination made not only for convenience but also due to the fact that a very keen rivalry has existed between the various young men's social clubs or fraternities. Therefore, all fraternity men are listed under one heading, social clubs or fraternities. The table mentioned which has been compiled from data collected through the return of the questionnaires gives the names of the various clubs and organizations and the number of athletes that were members of them.

In regard to the marital status of the athletes of North Texas State Teachers College during this period, there are eighty-three athletes that are married, seventy-nine

Prior to coming to college or when the athletes enrolled in the college as freshmen, the cards filled out by all students in the registrar's office files show that 36.7% of the lettermen during this period came from farms, that is their parent or guardian was engaged in the occupation of farming. In addition to farming, the parents and guardians of the athletes duscussed during this period were engaged in thirty-six other occupations. Table XXIII gives the occupations engaged in by the parents or guardians and the number who engaged in the various occupations. Data could only be secured on one handred and forty-eight of the athletes.

After graduating from or leaving school, the athletes have engaged in occupations quite varied from those of their parents or guardians. For comparison, the parents or guardians

of sixty-nine boys were farmers, and only six of the athletes turned out to be farmers. As can easily be understood and expected due to coaching interest and the fact that they attended a teachers college, more boys selected the teaching profession than any of the other occupations. Table XXIV gives the various occupations as well as the number of boys who have followed this occupation. The twenty-six athletes who are listed as students are either in North Texas State Teachers College or Graduate School or elsewhere as graduate students. The following chapter will deal with their where-abouts more extensively than this table does.

PRESENT OCCUPATIONAL STATUS

As could naturally be expected, since these athletes attended a teachers college, a larger group of the boys are connected with the teaching profession. A total number of ninety-two athletes, which is 48.94% of the group studied, are in the teaching profession. Some of the athletes who have been out of school for some time have quit active coaching and have remained in the profession as administrators and teachers. Others are serving their community in the capacity of administrator and coach, that is they hold the position of principal and coach in the high school. One athlete who earned his letter during this period is a professor in the biology department at Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College while another is serving as business manager of the Methodist Orphan's Home in Waco, Texas. Only two former lettermen have jobs as superintendents of schools while four are serving as principal of either elementary or high schools with no coaching assignment attached to their job. Table XXV gives the number of athletes who are in the various capacities of the teaching profession.

Since salaries in the teaching profession in Texas are not extremely high and more of these boys are employed in teaching than in any other profession, the salaries received by this group do not run very high. However, most school systems allow some extra compensation for their coaches; the

median salary for athletes can be expected to be somewhat above that of the class room teacher.¹ The median salary for the athletes who earned letters during this period is \$1211.76 per year. This median was secured by using data from questionnaires of ninety-three athletes who were cooperative enough to send in the data on salaries. These ninety-three athletes are from the various professions and not from the teaching profession only. Table XXVI shows the data arranged in a frequency table.

As to the success that these boys have made in life after leaving college, no conclusion will be reached . As has been stated before a majority of them are in school and working toward their first degree or other degrees. Out of the one hundred and eighty-eight athletes, there are only
