Final grant report to the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) Olga Taussky Todd Celebration of Careers in Mathematics for Women

[Grant DE-F602-99ER25385]

This grant was proposed to be supplemental funding for a Conference which would be documented by publication of conference information in the AWM Newsletter and then inclusion of the Proceedings and other information generated in a book. The conference was successfully held and documented in the AWM Newsletter (Vol. 29 No. 6; Vol. 30 No. 1). Work is in progress on the extensive and complicated related publication which involves 50 authors beyond those from the conference.

The Olga Taussky Todd Celebration of Careers in Mathematics for Women featured the legacy of Taussky Todd (1906-1995), who was an inspiration to a number of the mathematicians present. The Celebration was held at the Mathematical Sciences Research Institute (MSRI) in Berkeley, CA, on July 16-18, 1999. It was attended by over 100 women and men mathematicians at all career stages. The planning and implementation was accomplished by several committees with the support of experienced staff members at AWM and MSRI.

The primary goals of this celebration were accomplished: encouraging, assisting and inspiring graduate students and postdoctoral participants, providing a forum for networking between mathematicians at various career levels, and promoting the achievements of women in mathematics including the celebration namesake. Employing a productive feature from the AWM Workshops, graduate student and recent Ph. D.'s were matched with senior women mathematicians (from academia and industry) for mentoring, which began with a relaxed lunchtime discussion. The small-group format produced many effective discussions about writing successful grant proposals, job search techniques, childcare, time management, careers in industry, and negotiating the path toward academic tenure, as well as discussions on the mentees' own research.

Thirty-seven graduate students and recent Ph.D participants presented their research in three poster sessions. The conference also featured plenary talks and panels. Two of the talks, a panel, and after-dinner remarks were entered on the work and career path of Taussky Todd. In the eight additional talks, distinguished women in the mathematical sciences discussed their research and their employment while sharing personal experiences and advice. Two panels centered on choices and issues faced by those beginning mathematical careers.

The responses from participants of this conference have been highly positive. As mentioned by many of the participants, the conference provided an excellent opportunity for interaction with fellow women mathematicians in various specializations. The mentors provided wise and realistic advice, and the conference outlined potential strategies to help women pursue more successful careers in the mathematical sciences.

Enclosed are copies of flyers/announcements, programs, and two collections of material in the AWM Newsletter described the conference and presented much of the
