- We were already meeting most of the graduate student's daily needs such as printing, interlibrary loan, and spaces for individual and group study.


Growth of the Toulouse Graduate School at UNT

- 83 master's degrees
- 37 doctoral degrees

Definition

...an extension or elaboration of career development or professional attainment theory (Tinto, 1994).



Academic Life Cycle

Stages Versus Life Cycle or Life Course:

Career stages research: evolution of people and careers over a life time.

Life cycle or life course approach: psychological view of adult development, the total life of a person, addresses factors associated with various areas of life (not just work) (Sonnefeld & Kotter, 1982).

Beeler's 4 Stage Framework of Graduate Student Adjustment to Academic Life





Figure 1: Beeler's 4 Stage Framework of Graduate Student Adjustment to Academic Life. Adapted from "Graduate student adjustment to academic life: A four-stage framework," by K.D. Beeler, NASPA Journal, 28(2), 163-171. doi 10.1080/00220973.1991.11072201




Tinto's (1994) Model of Doctoral Student Persistence

Life Cycle Needs of Graduate Students

- Resources, services and spaces graduate students need at specific points in their academic lifecycles
- Timing is important in fulfilling these needs
- Can vary widely by discipline, degree, program and level



Life Cycle Needs: Emotional

Graduate students need . . .

- To be socially and academically integrated into their programs (Tinto, 1994).
- Social interaction for intellectual and skill development necessary to complete the doctoral degree (Tinto, 1994).
- To form close ties with those on their committee and their advisor (Tinto, 1994).
- Support and encouragement to move from not knowing what they do not know to knowing they know (Beeler, 1991).
