Dictionary Definition of "Kundalini"

Gene Kieffer wrote (1994, p. 169) that "the word 'kundalini' has still to appear in any dictionary." He was wrong. It is to be found in the 3801-page, two-volume *New Shorter Oxford English Dictionary* (Oxford, England: Clarendon Press, 1993). The definition reads:

1 The latent (female) energy which lies coiled at the base of the spine (late C19). 2 In full *Kundalini yoga*. A type of meditation which aims to direct and release this energy (mid C20)

Kieffer may think this definition inadequate, but the dictionary's editor would doubtless appreciate his improvement on her definition, providing it was no longer than the original.
