

Soapbox


- Libraries should be flexible and adaptive

- Must consider both objective AND subjective data
- Decisions should not be left solely to non-librarians

Collections as a Service




Consider what a collection does rather than what a collection is.

Access, not Ownership Success is not dependent on:




Instead, we ask: "Do we support research & teaching in this subject area?"


Decouple Assessment from Budgeting

	Planning	Assessment
Then	Each subject area allocated a small budget according to perceived need.	Did we spend the budget for this subject area?
Now	Which areas need enhancements according to user needs assessment ? What would be the most effective products to meet this need?	Do our assessments show we support research and teaching in this subject area?


- Review (Check-up) Meetings

 - Sustained Assessment












U R Doin' It Rite!
