

GUIDE TO BICENTENNIAL ORGANIZATIONS

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INTRODUCTION

As the United States approaches the focal period of its Bicentennial celebration, the year 1976, citizens throughout the country are seeking ways to participate in their nation's 200th "birthday party." A major problem for those wishing to support existing programs, or those with ideas of their own, is where to turn for information and advice. American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA), created as an executive agency to serve as a national clearinghouse for Bicentennial activities, promotes State and local programs through advice on organization and projects, financial assistance, and the distribution of Bicentennial publications and commemorative materials. Although the celebration of America's Bicentennial is a national affair, local programs encourage the participation of the greatest number of people. Since it is impossible within the scope of this publication to direct individuals to the specific activities in their local communities (ARBA's "Official Master Register of Bicentennial Activities" attempts to describe a number of them), this guide can only suggest national and State groups that are involved in Bicentennial projects. If an individual is unaware of a local Bicentennial office or association, his first contact should be his State or territorial Bicentennial organization. These are listed on pages 44-53.

This guide is arranged by type of organization, beginning with the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration and other Federal departments and agencies undertaking specific Bicentennial projects; State commissions and historical societies (including territorial agencies, i.e. for American Samoa, District of Columbia, Guam, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands); and, finally, a section on the Bicentennial projects of selected organizations.

The American Revolution Bicentennial Administration (ARBA) is the principal Federal coordinating body for the development and promotion of Bicentennial activities. On July 4, 1966, Congress passed legislation establishing an American Revolution Bicentennial Commission "to plan, encourage, develop, and coordinate the commemoration of the American Revolution Bicentennial" (PL 89-491). Subsequent amendments shaped the responsibilities and activities of the Commission. Beleaguered by seemingly insurmountable organizational problems, however, the Commission was restructured and renamed the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration in 1973 under PL 93-179. The current Bicentennial Administration operates under an 11-member governing body (the ARBA Policy Board), a 25-member advisory council, and two statutory executive positions: an Administrator (John W. Warner, former Secretary of the Navy) and a Deputy Administrator (Marjorie Lynch). In addition

to its Washington, D.C. headquarters, 10 regional ARBA offices throughout the nation assist coordination of State, territorial, and local activities.

ARBA programs operate within three national themes: Heritage '76, focusing on the past; Festival U.S.A., celebrating the Bicentennial, and Horizons '76, looking to the country's third century. In addition, the Bicentennial Administration has organized programs dealing with women ("Women's Coalitions"), youth ("Youth Awareness Campaign"), and Bicentennial Communities. The organization also publishes a number of materials designed to promote awareness of Bicentennial activities, including the newsletter Bicentennial Times, an "Official Master Register of Bicentennial Activities," and a "Master Calendar of Events."

[The paragraphs that follow are taken from an ARBA information circular:]

As of April, 1975, there were 3,501 officially designated Bicentennial Communities in the nation. Of these, 133 were cities with a population over 100,000; 412 with populations between 25,000 and 100,000; 2,195 with populations under 25,000. County subdivisions accounted for 747 and 14 were Native American Communities.

The ARBA has recently started a companion program which provides official recognition for the nation's colleges and universities. Through April, 96 schools had been named a Bicentennial campus. One of the requirements to become a officially recognized community or campus is


to submit to the ARBA a comprehensive plan for commemorating the Bicentennial. At least one project or program must have lasting value past 1976. The ARBA has also started similar programs for overseas communities and U.S. military installations and units.

To further stimulate involvement and participation in the Bicentennial, the ARBA sponsors the National Bicentennial Service Alliance
(NBSA) and the National Bicentennial Hospitality Alliance (NBHA). The
NBSA is open to national voluntary organizations whose primary purposes
are to address community needs through nonpaying activities by their
members. The NBHA includes organizations whose primary purpose
is to conduct sustained programs to expand interpersonal exchange and
communications among individuals of different communities and countries.

The ARBA also supports a Bicentennial Ethnic Racial Council (BERC) which serves as an advisory group concerned with methods to increase ethnic and racial participation in the commemoration of the nation's 200th anniversary.

Additionally, the ARBA grants national recognition to selected major Bicentennial projects "to encourage support for these events and insure public awareness of those events which are of regional, national or international significance. Recognition through ARBA sponsored programs entitles community and project sponsors to use the national Bicentennial symbol in their activities.

The national Bicentennial symbol is derived from the stars, stripes and colors of the United States flag. It takes the form of a 5-pointed star, surrounded by continuous red, white and blue stripes which form a second star. The words "American Revolution Bicentennial 1776-1976" may circle the symbol:



The ARBA has also instituted a national commemorative licensing program for items which will help commemorate the nation's 200 anniversary. The licensing program permits use of the official symbol on such items or packages along with the words "Officially Recognized Commemorative of the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration." Licensed firms will pay royalties to the ARBA which will be used primarily as matching grants to help support selected Bicentennial projects around the country. Items must be commemorative or educational and must meet high standards of quality and safety. (See Exhibit 1, p. 13.)

In addition to funds from the licensing program, the ARBA also has available for matching grants money from the sale of commemorative medals, and \$200,000 per State appropriated by the Congress. The ARBA fund-raising commemorative medals program was launched on February 5, 1972, when Congress and the President of the United States authorized the U.S. Mint to strike a series of special Bicentennial medals to "commemorate specific historical events of great importance, recognized nationally as milestones in the continuing progress of the United States of America toward life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." Congress has since authorized the ARBA to continue the commemorative medals program through 1976 to support future Bicentennial efforts. In each year through the Bicentennial, the ARBA will issue a single bronze and single silver medal with a special National medal in 1976. (See Exhibit 2, p. 14.)

The ARBA is required by law to develop and maintain ". . . a Bicentennial calendar or register of programs and projects, and in other ways provide a central clearing house for information and coordination regarding dates, events, places, documents, artifacts, and personalities of Bicentennial historical and commemorative significance."

This is being accomplished by means of a "Bicentennial Information Network"--"BINET" for short. This is a computer into which is fed a description of each project, its sponsor, dates, locations, events associated with the project, subject-matter, method of presentation and the like. Questions to BINET produce answers on any of these subject. BINET information is available to the Bicentennial staff, to the State Bicentennial Commissions, to government agencies at all levels, to foreign governments, the travel industry, the news media, and to the public in general.

Based on its BINET database, ARBA publishes a calendar of events of national and international significance and another one including a more comprehensive listing of events of regional and State interest. The calendars are updated periodically. They are available to the travel and tour industry and the nation's print and broadcast media in the hope that the information will then become available to the general public. Description

Grants are made to state bicentennial commissions which in turn may make matching grants to eligible entities for bicentennial projects that fall into one or more of the three ARBA thematic areas.

- Festival USA, focusing on the traditions, culture, hospitality, and character of the United States and its people;
- Heritage '76 involving the study of United States history and the reaffirmation of the American Revolution's governing principles.
- Horizons '76, dealing with such issues as urban development, community beautification, visual pollution, education, nutrition, child care, and ecology.

For Whom

State bicentennial commissions; state and local government agencies; nonprofit, tax-exempt organizations.

Assistance

Matching block grants to state bicentennial commissions; project grants of up to 50 percent of total project costs to be matched by eligible grantees.

In fiscal year 1975, one-time \$200,000 grants were made to each state bicentennial commission from appropriated funds and, in fiscal years 1974 and 1975, \$40,000 grants were made to each state from nonappropriated funds. The average of grants to nonprofit organizations is unknown.

Phillis Wheatley Poetry Festival in Mississippi; guidebook to New Hampshire architectural landmarks; outdoor historical musical drama in New Jersey; Black Heritage Arts and Crafts Festival in New Mexico; Readers Theater Touring Program to bring Mark Twain to school students in North Carolina; concert of eighteenth-century symphonic music in North Carolina; Texas traveling Ballet Folktorico; conference on American Cultural Heritage in Washington.

SUMMARY OF THE LIBRARY OF CONGRESS' PRESENT AMERICAN REVOLUTION BICENTENNIAL PROGRAM

- Letters of the Delegates to Congress, 1774-1789: publication in approximately 25 volumes. Copies of more than 19,000 letters, documents, and diary entries composed by delegates to the Continental Congress and the Congress of the Confederation have been located and copies accessioned. With collection and annotation being financed by a grant from the Ford Foundation and publication by the Library of Congress through the Government Printing Office, the Letters project is the Library's major Bicentennial undertaking. The first 2 volumes will be issued in 1976.
- Symposia on the American Revolution: a series of five scholarly symposia (one each May from 1972 through 1976) devoted to fostering a deeper understanding of the Revolution. The Symposia Series is funded by a grant from the Morris and Gwendolyn Cafritz Foundation of Washington, D.C. The papers presented at the first three symposia, respectively, The Development of a Revolutionary Mentality, The Fundamental Testaments of the American Revolution, and Leadership in the American Revolution, have been published. The fourth symposium will deal with "The Impact of the American Revolution Abroad" and the Department of State has given the Library some assistance for the travel of foreign scholars.
- Guides: guides to manuscripts and to prints and drawings of the Revolutionary period in LC are in press and a guide to maps is being prepared. The guide to manuscripts is scheduled for delivery in late February. It is hoped that a guide to women's papers in LC's collections can be compiled and published.
- Bibliographies: three already published—The American Revolution: A Selected Reading List: Periodical Literature on the American Revolution; and, for young people, Creating Independence, 1763-1789. A comprehensive bibliography, Revolutionary America, 1763-1789, containing more than 12,000 entries has nearly been completed but is not yet in press.
- Reprints of scarce Revolutionary Period pamphlets: one volume, English

 Defenders of American Freedoms, 1774-1789, has been published; others are being considered.
- Original source materials: heretofore neglected source materials, such as a memoire of John Paul Jones to Louis XVI, are being prepared for publication. A volume, "A Decent Respect to the Opinions of Mankind": Congressional Justifications of American Policy Before Independence, consisting of memorials to the peoples of Quebec, Great Britain, Ireland, and North America, petitions to the King, and circular letters, is in press.
- Facsimiles: a facsimile of Paul Revere's engraving of the Boston Massacre and two 1778 rebuses have been produced, with other facsimiles to follow. The adventures of an American privateer during the Revolution, a facsimile of the journal of Gideon Olmsted, is being prepared for the press.
- The Declaration of Independence: in 1976 the Library and the Princeton University
 Press will cooperate in the issuance of a revised and enlarged edition of
 Dr. Julian P. Boyd's definitive volume, The Declaration of Independence.
- Music: a concert (or series of concerts) of classical music our Revolutionary ancestors may have heard will be presented in the spring of 1976 by the Juilliard String Quartet, LC's Quartet in Residence; and choral and music-dance programs are also being considered. With a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, LC will produce 15 two-sided L-P's of folk music in America. LC in cooperation with the Eastman School of Music will present the Bicentennial premiere of America's first native-written ballad-opers in LC's Coolidge Auditorium, probably on October 28, 29, and 30, 1976. By Andrew Barton and entitled "The Disappointment, or, The Force of Credulity," the libretto was first published in 1767. The tunes for a number of the songs-mamong them "Yankee Doodle"--survive, but a modern musical score, faithful to the 18th century, is being prepared by ESM, which will also produce the opera for showing at LC, as well as for TV, recording, and perhaps a tour after the Washington premiere.
- Exhibits: a major exhibit on the American Revolution in the Library's Great Hall will open on April 24, 1975, the 175th anniversary of the Library of Congress. A brochure based on this exhibit, To Set A Country Free, has already been issued, as has Twelve Flags of the American Revolution, which pictures and describes 12 banners that have been replicated for use in the exhibit. Americans in Children's Books, describing an LC exhibit (November 1974-January 1975), presents a sampling of 18th- and 19th-century children's books. Other small Bicentennial exhibits will be on view between 1976 and 1983, some of which will be available for loan.
