## U.S. MILITARY PERSONNEL STRENGTHS BY COUNTRY OF LOCATION

SINCE WORLD WAR II, 1948-73

## Introductory Note

The purpose of this report is to bring together the best available unclassified data as to the numbers of U.S. military personnel stationed in foreign countries during the period since World War II. The authors have been unable to find any one compilation of such information due apparently to security considerations, the division of responsibility among the services and various offices within the services, and the fact that many of the pertinent military records have been retired. It is hoped that these tables, which are the result of a thorough search of statistical records held by the Armed Services historical offices, the Army Library, the National Archives, and various offices in the Department of Defense, will be a useful reference work. In compiling these figures no effort has been made to determine the foreign policy implications or to analyze trends in recent U.S. deployment strategy.

It should be noted that the data presented for years subsequent to 1966 cannot be considered as accurate or complete as those for prior years because the precise numbers and overseas locations of U.S. military personnel for the  $\frac{1}{}$  period after 1966 are still classified. Thus, with the exception of statistics for Vietnam, country data presented for the later years represent, in most instances, unclassified "estimates" (round numbers) that have been periodically released in recent years by the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs.

Table I, constituting the main part of the report, shows U.S. military personnel  $\frac{2}{2}$  strengths in some 30 countries, including the United States. These have been

listed alphabetically, under appropriate regional groups, for selected years from 1948 through 1973. The effective dates of the data presented were not selected because they reflect important shifts in American foreign or defense policy but were chosen, for the most part, because these were the dates for which the most complete set of statistics was available. Because of an interest in America's involvement in the conflict in Southeast Asia, a separate table (Table II) has been included providing a detailed listing of U.S. military personnel strengths in South Vietnam from the early 1950's up until March, 1973.

To avoid cluttering, footnote reference numbers have not been placed on Table I. Readers wishing to determine the source of any figure on the table should consult the footnote section at the end of the report where sources have been listed by year and location as well as some additional statistical data and explanatory material.

Three charts\* have been included to illustrate shifting trends in U.S. deployment strategy since the end of World War II. Charts I and II were prepared from the data on Table I and Chart II from data on Table II.

As for the sources used, the strength figures for 1948 on Table I were compiled from declassified tables prepared by the Army, Navy (including the Marine Corps), and Air Force and were checked against more limited but related tables prepared by the Department of Defense in 1967. The data cited for 1950, 1953, and 1955 through 1966 were drawn exclusively from declassified deployment tables produced by the Statistical Services Center, Office of the Secretary of Defense.

All figures presented for years from 1969 through 1973 in the worldwide, United States, and outside United States categories on Table I were taken from unclassified statistical tables prepared by the Department of Defense. A small number of exact country figures shown for 1969, which were declassified by the Department of Defense for inclusion in congressional testimony, were taken from the Senate hearings on <u>United States Security Agreements and Commitments</u> <u>Abroad (1969-1970)</u>. Only a few of the country strength estimates on Table I were drawn from secondary sources such as the Congressional Record, New York Times, Christian Science Monitor, and U.S. News & World Report, and these were invariably reported as having been originally obtained from the Department of Defense. The remaining country statistics, representing official, unclassified estimates, were obtained directly from the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs.

Statistics on Table II showing U.S. military personnel strengths in Vietnam from June 1953 to March 1973 were drawn exclusively from declassified and unclassified tables prepared by the Department of Defense. In order to make as much information available as possible, strength figures on Table II have been broken down on an annual basis for the period 1953-1964, on a quarterly basis for the period 1965-1966, and on a monthly basis for the period 1967 to 1973. In addition, all data on Table II have been broken down by branch of service (except for the March 31, 1973 figure). Because U.S. military personnel stationed aboard ships offshore are not included in the Vietnam totals, offshore totals (including Navy and Coast Guard personnel) have been cited in footnote references wherever applicable. To our knowledge, this is the most accurate and complete unclassified summary of U.S. military personnel strengths in Vietnam available.







#### 1948

#### Notes on data for 1948

- (a) All statistics in the categories world-wide, United States, and outside United States and all country statistics for the Army, Navy, and Marine Corps are for June 1948. Statistics for Air Force personnel in foreign countries, however, are for March 31, 1949, as no earlier country breakdown for the Air Force was available. Thus, while total personnel listed in foreign countries amounts to 410,540, the total shown in the outside United States category is only 400,766. The difference between these totals, which is 9774 personnel, is due to the fact that this additional number of Air Force personnel were stationed abroad between June 1948 and March 31, 1949.
- (b) A table prepared by the Department of Defense in 1967 indicates that 184,993 Navy and Marine Corps personnel were afloat and mobile world-wide as of June 30, 1948. Tables prepared by the Navy in mid-1948 indicate that only 17,045 Navy and Marine Corps personnel were afloat and mobile in the Atlantic, Mediterranean, and Pacific in June 1948. It is therefore assumed that the remaining 167,948 personnel afloat and mobile were assigned to duty with the First and Second Fleets based in the United States. Available information on the number of ships deployed in the Western Pacific, Eastern Atlantic, and Mediterranean suggests, however, that statistics cited for personnel afloat and mobile outside United States are far too low. According to the Annual Report of the Secretary of the Navy for FY 1949 (Washington, U.S. Govt. Print. Off., 1950. pp. 208-209), U.S. Naval Forces in the Western Pacific consisted of three cruisers, one and a half destroyer squadrons, one small amphibious group, essential logistic support ships, and miscellaneous small craft. The same report states that Naval Forces in the Eastern Atlantic and Mediterranean were being maintained at the strength of one aircraft carrier, three to four cruisers, one and a half destroyer squadrons, and appropriate amphibious and auxiliary vessels. Although no other source for fleet personnel strengths in 1948 could be located, it is reasonable to assume that more than 17,045 personnel would have been needed to man all the ships assigned to Atlantic and Pacific Fleets in 1948.

(c) U.S. military personnel strength in Korea reached a pre-Korean war peak of 72,360 on November 30, 1945. However, by December 31, 1948, the number had dropped to 13,948. On June 30, 1949, six months later, it reached a post-World War II low of 506. It remained relatively stable at this level until the outbreak of warfare in June 1950, when it rose to a post-World War II peak of 325,270 by June 30, 1953. See U.S. Army. ## Note on data for 1969-1973

Due to the limited availability of country statistics and due to the necessity of having to consult multiple sources for such data for the above years, the effective dates of statistics in the world-wide, United States, and outside United States categories and the effective dates of country statistics do not coincide in every case. The problems entailed in using multiple sources, different effective dates, and round numbers coupled with a near complete absence of unclassified data on the number of U.S. military personnel in the other countries, Latin America and Caribbean, afloat and mobile, and undistributed categories inevitably produced significant discrepancies between the sum of country totals shown and totals given in the outside United States category for the years cited above.
